## Hospital Tribume Report

Snowmass-at-Aspen, Colo.-The single most serious cause of ski injuries is the friction between boot and ski, according to Gordon C. Lipe, a ski equipment consultant of Skaneateles, N.Y.

Noting that the ski injury rate is 35,000 lower-extrenity fractures a year, he said that "we can no longer tolerate the crude mechanisns for linking the boot to the ski."

Of more than 50 branus of relcasable bindings on the market, "only about 10 would meet a minimum set of standards which, by the way. are nonexistent. .. To be blunt. we know of no one releasable binding that fulfills the intended purpose," he told a meeting sponsored by the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons.

Mr. Lipe predicted that the incidence of sking injuries could be "significantly" reduced by the use of releasable bindings with mechanical amifriction devices properly installed to allow the units to furtction.

The bindings of the "near future," he said, will have the following advantages not presently availabie: the ability to maintain constant margins of retention and safety in any situation or skier attitude, simplicity of design: adaptable to any type boot and ski, easy to properiy install, readily adjustable to boot size, and available in predetermined ranges of use with resrivied aufusment For tension wibhin the range of use.

Mr. ${ }^{\text {lipe }}$ warned that present bindings are too often placed at the wrong location in the ski-too far forward or backwardand that the skier wearing a size-6 boot needs a dificrent location than one wearing a size-12.
