FUTURE AVAILABILITY OF SKIING

(Former PVS President Geoff Wadey has sent some thoughtful comments on the future of skiing. Below TOOT prints the gist of Geoff's message. All skiers should take note.)

Recent events, the ESA Convention and a BRSC/ASF meeting, have made me realize how much the world has changed for skiers. The issue is no longer the cost or convenience of skiing but the AVAILABILITY.

Gas and fuel oil shortages threaten not only the skier's ability to get to a ski area but the ability of the area to serve him.

For example, there is a serious lack of buses to move people from the Denver airport to ski areas on weekends; jet fuel is so tight airlines are no longer interested in charter business or extra ski loads; possible negligence suits threaten the existence of some ski areas.

Many ski organization officials still think it is enough to get us a 10% midweek ticket discount at, say, Mahoney Mtn in Keokuk, Iowa, when there may not be a resort there next time we try to get to tt and we may not be able to get there anyway.

All is not hopeless. Things can be done through our existing ski organizations, drastically modified, if necessary, or through new organizations if we need them. Each issue must be tackled separately by working cooperatively with airlines and bus companies, changing our weekend ski habits, political action on the state and Federal levels, and pressuring regulatory agencies.

The USSA and its divisions, our clubs and area councils, manufacturers' assocs., the Natl. Ski Patrol and the lobbying and marketing organization in Washington, the American Ski Federation, must work together for ALL skiers.

Each of us, individual and association, must help to identify

problems and make constructive suggestions for solving them.

Those of us in contact with congress, state governments or regulatory agencies must alert our organizations to the existence and status of problems and suggest how influence can be exerted in order to keep skiing AVAILABLE.
