What:

Climb Old Rag Mountain in Shenadoah National Park.

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The Park Guide gives this description: "The rich rewards resulting from climbing Old Rag do not come easily. The climb is long and strenuous involving a total ascent of 2,400 feet in three miles (via the Ridge Trail). Portions of the trail are very rough, steep, or both. Nevertheless, if you have a stout heart, a good supply of energy, and the necessary time, you can look to Old Rag as offering one of the most enjoyable, worthwhile, and unforgettable experiences obtainable in the Park." Circuit hike- 8 miles.

Time: 8:00 A.M. Meet at the Cooper School just inside the Beltway at Exit 13, Rte 193, Georgetown Pike. The school is on the right of #193 on Battle Hill Road. Carpooling will be arranged there. See sketch map below.

An early departure is desirable to allow for the 85 mile drive and an unpressured climb. Please be on time. Bring coffee and Danish to consume in car if you don't have time for breakfast.

B.ring: Besides stout heart, stamina, and sturdy shoes, bring Junch, gorp (trail snack of granola bar, raisins, chocolate, etc.), plenty of water and, perhaps, liquid spirits left on ice in your car to restore muscle spirits at trail's end. If you care to bring a camera, there are magnificent views.


