
THIRTEENTH INTERNATIONAL DINNER








MAY EVENT	OLD RAG CLIMB

APRIL MEETING

The April 20th Annual Meeting was graciously hosted by Jean and Reg Heitchue. The meeting included the election of officiers (see President's Message) and the election of new members (see below). President Bob Marx gave the following annual report:

The past year has been one of continued modest expansion for PVS with approximately a 10 percent growth in membership. It also has been a banner year for trips and events, highlighted by three major 2-week ski trips (PVS is one of the few BRSC Clubs to offer 2-week ski trips): one to Neustift and Mayrehofen, Austria; a second to Sierra Nevada, Spain and Oukaimeden, Morocco; and, two weeks in Utah. Other club ski trips included 2 weekends at Wisp and a 1-week trip to Sutton, Quebec. All trips were hugh successes!

Besides these "appropriate" activities for a ski club, we also had 3 hikes, 2 beach parties, 5 dinners (ranging from a very casual crab-feast to our annual international dinner gala), 4 super parties (New Years Eve, St. Patricks Day, Wine & Cheese, and Christmas), 2 bike hikes, and three "special events" (an all day winery tour, a tour of the Naval Observatory, and a tour of the catacombs under the Lincoln Memorial); all of this in addition to our regularly scheduled monthly meetings.

The clubs appetite for haute-cusine led to the production of a major new cook book documenting the finest recipes of PVS's finest cooks. Weighing in at 133 expertly formatted pages, it is a super bargain at \$6.95 and has become our first best-seller.

The meeting concluded with two new ski movies - one on Grand Targhee, Idaho, by Bob Grasley, and one on the 1981 World Cup Races at Aspen presented by Keith Lyon.
