MARCH MEETING by Lu Beale



SUNNY SUN VALLEY by John Smith

Early on Tuesday morning, March 1, 10 PVS members arrived at Dulles Airport for the long trip to Sun Valley, Idaho. This was the last chance to get out of Washington before another of the regularly scheduled ice storms. We arrived in Boise, Idaho to a temperature of 68° F and brilliant sunshine. Shirley Rettig joined us in Boise for the rest of the trip.

Sun Valley lived up to its name and every day was "Sun" day. A few days the temperatures were in the 50's and then cooled to the 40's. Old Baldy mountain has some of the most picturesque and under graded trails of any mountain. A "green" trail at Sun Valley would be rated at least a "blue" trail any place else. They have the largest snowmaking in the world and nearly all of the lifts have been upgraded recently to detachable quads. A really great, but quite challenging mountain. COOK'S CORNER

Many requests were made of Vivian Barry to share her recipes from the Beach week-end. She has graciously provided two that

all seem to enjoy. She has added comments regarding PVS which I will pass along to you. The Spring Dinner at the party room of Bette Walker will be held on March 26. This column provides a couple of the appetizers.

BAKED PEAR BRIE

Cut top from medium size (8 oz.) round of Brie

Spread evenly over the top:

- 1 (6 oz.) jar pear preserves

Sprinkle top with:

- 1/2 cup almond or pecan pieces

Bake in 350° oven for 15-20 minutes or until soft in the center. Serve with English Water Waters, Wheat Biscuits, and/or Sourdough Rounds. Serves many depending on the number of additional hors d'oeuvres served. This is very rich and guests seem to love it.

BARRY'S PVS BISQUE

In large kettle or Dutch oven, cook together until soft and lightly browned:

- 3 Tablespoons unsalted butter
- 3 onion, coarsely chopped
- 1-2 cloves garlic, minced or pressed

Add:

- 2 cups whole tomatoes, fresh or canned
- 2 cups potatoes, diced
- 1 can (16 oz.) cream corn or 2 cups cut from cob
- Up to 2 quarts of milk, depending on desired consistence
- Salt and Pepper to taste
- Sprigs of fresh sage, tarragon, chives, rosemary, thyme (or 1/2 teaspoon of each dried)
- Dash of Old Bay Seasoning

Cook over medium heat until potatoes are done.

10 minutes prior to serving, add:

 2 cups cooked lobster meat (after PVS has eaten all the good juicy tail meat) - 1 cup mussels (or whatever is left after the PVS cocktail party (can also use shrimp or a combination of the 2) Serve with warm herb bread, or sourdough bread and a good white wine. Vivian and Bob say "Bon Appetit!!!"

CHICKEN LIVER PATE

Rinse 1 lb. chicken livers in cold water and drain on paper towels. Remove and discard membrane or fat.

In a large skillet, sautė:

- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine
- 1/2 medium onion, chopped

Add:

- Chicken livers (from above)
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon tarragon
- 1/2 teaspoon sesame seeds
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Dash ground nutmeg and cinnamon

Cook until livers are firm and pink in center (5-10 minutes). DO NOT OVERCOOK. Pour mixture into food processor and blend until smooth. As mixture is blending, add:

- 2-4 Tablespoons sherry

Lightly grease 2-cup mold or bowl. Pour pate into mold and chill. When solid, turn out onto a serving platter. Garnish with parsley bits or sliced olives. Serve with crackers or toast points.

(I find it easier to unmold if I use a bowl and line with plastic wrap. Spray the plastic wrap with PAM or other vegetable spray. Place pate into bowl and chill. Upend onto platter, remove bowl, remove plastic wrap and smooth with knife, if necessary. Garnish as above.)

JEZEBEL

Mix well:

- 1 jar (6 oz.) pineapple jelly (Giant brand)
- 1 jar (6 oz.) apple jelly (Giant brand)
- 1 small can dry mustard (powdered)
- 1/4 1/2 jar horseradish

Cover and let this age (ferment) overnight. Do not refrigerate. Serve over cream cheese using club crackers to scoop. Also works well to have a small spreader.

Mixture is sufficient for 2-4 (8 oz.) packages of cream cheese.
