From Maryland - Beltway to Northern Virginia. Exit 13. Right on Georgetown Pike (193). 2nd left at Swinks Mill to next traffic light. Right on Old Dominion (3.7 mi). Take a left at 3d traffic light on Georgetown Pike (2 mi) to next traffic light. Right on Walker Road (1.1 mi) to Squires Trail. Left on Squires Trail to end of dirt road. Left on Haven Lane to 525 (left of cul-de-sac)

From McLean - Arlington. North on Old Dominion Drive (from

Charlie's Place) and continue as above on Old Dominion.

## WHITE-WATER RAFTING ON THE YOUGHIOGHENY

We're the Timex Team cuz we take "a sloshin and come out joshin!" The 12th, 20 of us headed North. Some of us made our way to "Fallingwater," the Frank Lloyd Wright "cabin" in the woods north of Ohiopyle, PA. His integration of home into nature and nature into home was interesting. Others went to Swallowtail Falls for a walk that was all the more enjoyable for temps in the low 80s. We regrouped at Dina's room for Champagne & hors d'ouvres and then caravanned to the Penn-Alps for dinner. T'was Pennsy Dutch all the way--hearty & inexpensive.

Sunday we trekked in squalls to Mountain Streams and Trails, Inc at Ohiopyle State Park where we absolved them of any ill effects we might? suffer participating in this (as Warren Miller would say) risk sport. As we bussed riverward, rain gave us a soaking before tapering off for the day. At the Youghiogheny (locally referred to as the Yock or Yo) we climbed with life vests and paddles into land-bound rafts for a very necessary and complete safety briefing. Danno, guide-in-chief, kept it from being ominous with splashes of humor mixed with lingering splashes of rain. We had two guides and a videographer in kayaks and two guides in rafts. One, Toby-wan-kenobe, got Dina, Mary Jane, and Charlotte thru in such fine style, Dina found it necessary to pour water on her head to stay as wet as the rest of us. The raft-up combined three large and five small groups. Briefing done, we waddled to the 65 degree river with our rafts.

The river was blanketed by tog which evoked the spirits of trappers and indians that used these waterways long ago. It also made the Class II(III?) and III(IV?) rapids (rapids are graded I to VI) hard to see. The first, ENTRANCE, dropped us 4 feet before we knew it. MEADOWRUN upped the ante, adding a turn most negotiated backwards. CUCUMBER let us know we were in high water when it chewed most of us up and spit us out. I bounced overboard and came back semi-sanstrunks. My trip was trivial compared to Bill, Betty, Bette & Lu who hit the WASHING MACHINE and decided to experience the spin cycle up close and personal--or Don who later cracked a tibia on an unplanned swim--or Bill who opened an eyebrow trying to break a paddle with his forehead. After a planned time-out, our guides talked us by the DIMPLE, a "small" 15 ton boulder right in the middle of where the water (and the rafts) wanted to go, followed by DOUBLE HYDRAULIC. RAILROAD, which tossed us in the direction of huge masonry railroad bridge piers, was a cakewalk (by comparison). SWIMMERS' RAPIDS offered a safe way to freeze our way down a short section sans raft. LUNCH was a repast layed out on flagstones with fresh fruit, make-ityourself Dagwoods and PB&Js (for those of us really reliving our childhoods). Back on the river, LOSE YOUR LUNCH got our immediate attention with its requirement for an S-turn to avoid another sensitivity session with a boulder. SCHOOLHOUSE was the first rapid the guides let us figure out on our own. At BRUNNER'S RUN, they talked us thru again. The sun joined us at ROCK GARDEN-a long section prior PVS'ers have had to portage, but not us. We bumped and spun our way along until garnered ashore again for words on how to deal with RIVER'S END an apparently solid rock wall across the river with a hidden cut which spit us out under a shale overhang just when we thought we were in the clear. TAKE OUT was a rippling Class I that came too soon for some, but the trek up the hill with rafts in hand was a real indicator of how much effort we had all put into the day. A few had enough stuff left to carry the rafts over their heads to the truck. The bus back reminded me of rides home from camp as a kid. The video review occurred almost immediately and was all too complete. Many thanks to Dina for organizing the event and to my crew Janet, Lisa and Uschi. Cowabunga Dudes!!!

Much has happened in the life of your cook since the column in April. May brought the Fun Run/Eat

with the Clarks. Recipes from that fabulous event are provided. Also, by popular request, "Death by Chocolate" baked by Mary Jane McCarthy. September and October will feature more from the Waln's LUAU.

### SAUSAGE BAKE Marilyn Clark

Cook until it looses red color, breaking into small pieces as you cook:

- 1 lb. regular sausage
- 1 1b. HOT sausage

Drain grease and add:

- 1/3 to 1/2 package (8 oz.) Pepperidge Farm Stuffing Mix
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 onion, chopped

Place in greased casserole and bake at 350° for 30 minutes.

### <u>LEMON LOAF</u> Marilyn Clark

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease loaf pan.

In large bowl, mix together:

- 2 1/4 cups flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 1/2 cups sugar

Cut in until mixture resembles coarse crumbs:

- 3/4 cup margarine

Stir in:

- 1 Tablespoon grated lemon peel
- 2 Tablespoons poppy seeds

In small bowl, beat slightly:

- 3 eggs

Stir in:

- 3/4 cup milk

Add egg mixture to flour mixture. Spoon into loaf pan and bake 1 1/4 hours. Cool for 10 minutes.

Heat to boiling over medium high heat:
- 4 1/2 teaspoons fresh squeezed lemon juice

- 2 Tablespoons sugar

Cook, stirring until slightly thickened - about 5 minutes. Brush with pastry brush over top of bread.

### DEATH BY CHOCOLATE Mary Jane McCarthy

Bake according to package directions: 1 (19.8 oz.) package family size brownie mix

Cool. Punch holes in brownies with fork and pour over brownies:

- 1/4 to 1/2 cup Kahlua or coffee liqueur

(Instead of alcohol you may substitute a mixture of 1 teaspoon sugar and 4 Tablespoons strong left-over black coffee)

Whip up according to package directions: - 3 (3.5 oz.) boxes Jello chocolate mousse

Break into small pieces in food processor or by hitting with hammer:

- 8 (1.2 to 1.4 oz.) Skor or Heath bars (If using hammer, leave bars in wrapper)

Set aside:

1 (12 oz.) container whipped topping

Break up half of the brownies and place in the bottom of a glass trifle dish. Cover with half of the mousse, layer with half of the broken candy and then add half of the whipped topping. Repeat layers with the remaining ingredients.

#### BACON DATES Janet/Chris Waln

Cut into half:

- 2 pounds center cut bacon

Wrap bacon halves, piece by piece around:
- 3 packages Dole pitted dates

Secure bacon with toothpick. Bake on wire rack over foil-lined tray at 350° for 35-40 minutes. Cook for 5 minutes before serving. Yields about 60.
