This pristine resort, built solely for skiing, offers more than 26,000 acres (40 square miles) of skiing in the midst of the majestic Andes Mountains. If that isn't enough, Valle Nevado has now been lift linked to two other valleys, La Parva and El Colorado, providing the largest ski circuit in the entire Southern Hemisphere. On this 11 day trip (shorter and longer stays are possible), we plan to ski for a week and spend three or four additional days in lovely, peaceful Santiago, the European styled capital of Chile. From there we plan to do some touring. Tentatively we will visit Valparaiso, Chile's largest seaport, Vina del Mar the year-round beach resort and playground of South America's rich and famous, and Chile's picturesque wine country. We are also looking into optional visits to romantic, southern lake country and to Easter Island, home of the enigmatic, carved monoliths. All told, our trip should provide a spectacular introduction to a dramatic new Hemisphere.

Despite this being a 1997 trip, early planning is essential. There are only three hotels at Valle Nevado (and consequently no liftlines). If there is sufficient interest, we will visit Chile this September to set up the trip. We expect the 1997 trip will cost \$2,300 to \$2,400--with an \$80 to \$100 discount for seniors. This includes meals at Valle Nevado and lift tickets. COOK'S CORNER

While your cook has been goofing off, some of you have continued to enjoy offerings from our many good cooks. The EXCOM at Sarah Huggins found

PVSers enjoying many good recipes, but the hands down favorite is presented below.

PEACH BAVARIAN Sarah Huggins

Drain, chop.and set aside: - 1 can (16 oz.) sliced peaches Reserve 2/3 cup of juice

In a large bowl, mix until well dissolved:

- 2 packages (3.oz.) peach or apricot gelatin
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 cups boiling water

Stir in reserved peach juice and chill until slightly thickened.

Gently stir: - 1 teaspoon almond extract - 1 (8 oz.) carton whipped topping (Sarah used Cool Whip Light)

Gently fold in gelatin. Fold in reserved peaches. Pour mixture into oiled 6-cup mold. Chill overnight and unmold to serve. Serves 8 - 10.

BON APPETIT

TOMATO AND OLIVADA CROSTINI Nancy McKinley

Preheat oven to 350*.

Slice into 1/4-inch slices: - 1 16-inch loaf French bread Arrange bread in one layer on 2 baking sheets and sprinkle with: - 1/3 cup freshly grated Parmesan Toast slices in upper and lower thirds of oven until crisp and golden, 8-12 minutes. Cool. May be made 2 weeks ahead and kept in an airtight container at room temperature.

In a colander or sieve, place: - 2 (28 oz.) cans Italian whole tomatoes, seeded and drained (Press gently on solids to squeeze out as much liquid as possible and blot with paper towels.) Chop tomatoes fine.

Mash to a paste: - 1 small garlic clove - 1/2 teaspoon salt

In medium bowl, stir together:
- Chopped tomatoes
- 1/4 cup Extra Virgin olive oil

- Garlic paste
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- Salt and pepper to taste

Put a heaping teaspoon of the tomato mixture on each crostino and top with: - 1/4 teaspoon olive paste

Garnish with sprig of fresh parsley. Makes about 50.
