Directions to the Brockmeyers': Yacht Club Condo, Unit C-1, 301 Burnside Street, East Port (Annapolis) Md.

(From Baltimore area): Take 97 to Route 50 (Be careful when getting on 97 as it bears to right). Continue to Aris T. Allen Blvd (#665) This turns into Forest Drive. Take Forest Drive East. You will pass a very large Safeway and Annapolis Middle School.

Go left at Bay Ridge Drive (Crown Station on left side, go past SPCA). Bear right at Chesapeake Avenue. Continue until you see Rainbow Cleaners—this is Burnside Avenue. Turn left and go to end of street (dead end) and make a left onto Bayridge. Almost immediately make a right onto Burnside and go to water., Yacht Club Condo is a yellow building. We are on the first floor. Facing the building, we are on the extreme left. Park wherever you can on the street.

OR take Rowe Blvd. into Annapolis proper. Go to Church Circle and swing around to Duke of Gloucester Street. Stay in right lane until street deadends. Cross over bridge. After leaving bridge, make a right at first traffic light (Mercedes dealer on corner). Go to Burnside Street, make right, go to water.
