Then it was off to the Mt. Gate Restaurant, just down the road, and a fantastic buffet dinner with all the trimmings where the variety was mind boggling! Thanks to Charlie and Sara Huggins for planning such a wonderful day.

AUNT STELLA'S TUNA ANTIPASTO Ned Flaherty

The Aunt Stella belongs to Jackie, but Ned does the fixing.

Combine:

- 1 (6 1/2 oz.) can tuna
- 1 (2 oz.) jar green stuffed olives sliced (can use salad olives)
- 1 (3 1/2 oz.) jar small cocktail olives (quartered)
- (Ned says "Have fun with this one!)
- 1 (2-3 oz.) can sliced mushrooms
- 3/4 cup chopped sweet pickle mix (or sweet pickle relish) + 4 Tablespoons pickle juice
- 1/2 cup catsup
- 1/2 cup cocktail sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 or 2 dashes Tabasco sauce (or more to taste)

Makes 2 cups plus. Serve with chips or crackers. Ned says it will keep for weeks, unless you really want to eat it. Served at the November meeting.

SPINACH BALLS Nancy Ewing

Mix together well:

- 2 (10 oz.) packages frozen chopped spinach, cooked and drained well
- 1/2 cup oleo, room temperature
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan Cheese
- 1 cup finely chopped onions
- 1 Tablespoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme
- 2 cups stuffing mix (Nancy uses Pepperidge Farm Herb)
- 3 eggs
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Drop walnut sized portions onto waxed

paper. Freeze. Bag after freezing. Remove as needed for hors d'oeuvres. Bake in 350* oven on cookie sheet for 12-20 minutes. Makes 60 - 70. (From September meeting.)

CURRY CHICKEN ROLL Jessma Blockwick

Mix together well in blender or by hand. As you mix, add curry powder (lots) until mixture is hot. (Use the taste test to determine the degree of hot.)

- 2 cans white chicken meat or meat of one chicken
- 1 (8 oz.) package cream cheese (Jessma uses fat free or lite)

- Pinch of white pepper Put mixture into freezer until solidified enough to work with. Can be refrigerated overnight. Then, place mixture on waxed paper and shape into 2 logs. Roll in shredded unsweetened coconut. Pat coconut into log to ensure it adheres. Place logs onto serving dish. Make indentation down center of each log. Fill with Raffeto chut-nut (or any really good kind) chutney. Serve with crackers. (From the November meeting.)

CRAB MOLD Marty McNeill

Simmer, stirring until smooth, but DON'T BOIL.

- 1 can tomato soup
- 1 (8 oz.) cream cheese fat free

Dissolve and add to soup mixture: - 1/4 - 1/2 cup cold water

- 1 package unflavored gelatin
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- Remove from heat IMMEDIATELY.

Let mixture cool while you chop: - 1/2 cup (heaping) chopped onion - 1/2 cup (heaping) chopped celery - 2 (6 oz.) cans crab meat, rinsed (Marty used Crown-Prince - Fancy White) Add to tomato soup mixture. Place in

well-oiled mold. Chill. . Marty used the lovely fish shaped mold. Unmold and serve with crackers. November
