Ioin Nancy and Ray McKinley in Valle Nevado，Chile from August 14－25，1997．The Valle Nevado Ski Resort looks out at magnificent snow covered Andes on all sides．You can ski all day over the 4,000 vertical feet and 40,000 acres（Steamboat has 2，300 acres！）that comprise the Valle Nevado skifields．All the skiling is above tree line and very European，you can ski on or off－piste to your heart＇s content．There＇s also heliskiing（they have two helicopter pads）and dog sledding．But skiling isn＇t the only reason to go to Chile．There is much else． Thus，we are planning an 11 day trip（shorter and longer stays are possible）．After a week of skiing and eating fine Chilean food，we＇ll travel to Santiago to the 5 －Star Hotel Carrera，with its Chilean murals，commanding stalicase，and huge windows looking out at the President＇s palace． We will tour in beautlful Santiago，along the splendid seacoast and at an 1840＇s winery nearby．

The following great recipes were sent to me by Genee Boykin. However, at the January meeting, I found that the Rum Cake originated from Joan Flake. As the recipe was being discussed, I found that many PVSers have enioved it for vears. If it isn't in your file, you need to add it. It is great!!!

## RUM CAKE

Preheat oven to 325 . Grease and flour 10-inch bundt or tube pan. Sprinkle $1 / 2$ cup pecans in bottom of pan.

Mis together well:

- l/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1 vellow cate mix
- 1 pachage $13.5 \mathrm{oz} \cdot 1$-instant vanilla-pudding and pie mis
- 4 eggs
- $1 / 2$ cup water
- 1/2 cup dark or light run

Beat for 2 minutes. Pour carefulls into bundt pan. Bake $50-60$ minutes (when tester comes out clean). Remove from oven. Frick hales in bottom of cake before remoring from pan.
Remember to loosen all sides (including around tubel before removing from pan. Frick LOTS of holes all over cake (sides, top, bottoml. Pour hot run glaze slowly over cake. This is a messy job; see tips below.

## RUM GLAZE

In saucepan, melt:

- 1 stick butter

Add and boil for 5 minutes;

- 1/4 cup water
- 1 cup sugar

Remove from heat and add:

- 1/2 cup rum

Pour over cake. USE ENTIRE AMOUNT ON CAKE. Use spoon and pastry brush to help put glaze on cake. ( I place cake on wire rack sitting in cookie sheet. As the glaze falls to pan below, it can be scooped up and reapplied to cake.) After cake has absorbed all the glaze, transfer to clean serving platter.

## GHEESE CRUHCH MBISCUITS"

Mix together:

- 2 sticks butter
- 2 cups grated sharp Cheddar Cheese
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 2 cups Rice Krispies
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Cayenne red pepper to taste

Roll into balls the size of moth balls.

Place on cookie sheet. Press with fork to 1/4-inch thick. Sprinkle with more cayenne or paprika. Bake at 375* for $8-10$ minutes. Cool and store in tiglitly sealed containers.

BUTTER AND CHEESE SHOULD BE AT ROOM TEMPERATURE BEFORE MIXING.

## JALAPENO BITES

- 1 jar or can (7 oz.) whole jalapeno peppers (drain, rinse, remove seeds)
- 1/2 pound coarsely grated cheese

Cut peppers into thin. long strips and line bottom and sides of a greased 8or 9 -inch square baking dish. Press grated cheese over peppers. Use a layer of sharp cheddar followed by a larer of Monterey Jack.

Beat together and pour over cheese:

- 4 egss
- Garlic powder, to taste
- Salt, to taste or use garlic salt

Bake at 350* for 25-30 minutes. Cut into bite size pieces. Serve with tortilla chips or as finger food.
