PRESIDENT'S The subject today is hats. Well, not hats, exactly, but helmets. Consumer studies make it abundantly clear that ski SITZMARK

helmets, like the now ubiquitous bicycle helmet, are no longer for

nerds and children, but for every skier who wants to stay healthy to ski another day.

Here's the low-down recently released by the Consumer Products Safety Commission after thorough studies:

"Helmet use by skiers and snowboarders could prevent or reduce the severity of 44 percent of head injuries to adults...and 53 percent of head injuries to children under age 15."

There were 17,500 head injuries associated with skiing and snowboarding in 1997. The CPSC study estimates that 7,700 such injuries could be prevented or reduced in severity each year with the use of helmets.

Worried about costs? Good helmets start at \$100 although lesser quality head gear is available for as little as \$30. (Caveat: your bicycle helmet is not a proper substitute.)

Well, there're the facts. The rest is up to us. It could be that the helmet will be the ski fashion statement of the millenium.



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Report from the nominating committee

The Nominating Committee chaired by Bill Anderson and consisting of Suzanne Boisclair, Irene Farrell, Jack Ragen, Serge Triau and Bette Walker has met and nominated Nancy McKinley as President and the following members for two-year terms on the Executive Committee: Don Dillon, Charlotte Kline, and Sheldon Drews.

Elections will be held at the annual business meeting in April. Additional nominations may be made by the signed proposal of any five active members presented one month prior to the April meeting.

PROFILES

DON DILLON, M.D.

Born in New Hampshire, Don graduated from Dartmouth in 1956 and Harvard Medical School in 1959. In the U.S. Army Medical Corps 1959-72, he worked principally at Walter Reed but had assignments in other U.S. cities and in Korea. In Korea he qualified for membership in the Caterpillar Club. (You'll have to ask him.)

Don retired in 1992 after 20 years private practice of internal medicine, hematology and oncology. In retirement, Don operates a leisure travel business. His interests are fitness, skiing, boating, golf, family activities and travel. Don is married to PVSer Kathy Stearns Dillon and has a step daughter, Bridgette. His first wife died in 1986; they had 7 children. Currently there are 13 grandchildren.

He started skiing in the early 60's, had a long hiatus, and resumed in the 70's as a shared activity with his children.

He and Kathy joined PVS in 1994 to take part in its programs and ski trips and develop new friendships. They recently led a PVS ski trip to Telluride.

SHELDON DREWS

Sheldon is a Brooklyn native and graduated from the United States Naval Academy. He holds Master's degrees in Aeronautics and Astronautics from MIT and in Management (Data Processing) from the Navy Post Graduate School in Monterey, CA. He was also an Asst. Professor there for four years. Sheldon also was stationed in San Diego, Quonset Point, RI, and Washington, D.C. He has been retired for the past six years.

Sheldon's first ski experience was at Stowe in 1961. He joined SCWDC in 1973 and PVS in 1977. He has served the club in various capacities, including as president in the mid-80's.

Skiing tops the list of his favorite activities. He also enjoys hiking and reading, especially history.

Nancy McKinley was raised in southern New Jersey where the skiing is challenging. Not that kind of challenging! "How many times can you ski down into a man-made hole in the ground dabbed with artificial snow?" Nancy has one daughter, now 30, who's married to an English soccer player and computer guru.

Having never been west of Ohio, Nancy transplanted herself in 1981 to Okinawa which became a jumping off point for travel around the Far East. ("The skiing was lousy.") While there she taught English as all good expats do and completed her bachelor's degree in Management at the University of Maryland in Tokyo. Then on to northern Germany for a two year stint and lots of travel in Europe with ski trips in northern Germany ("a lot like Round Top, only smaller") and Zermatt.

She moved to DC in 1985 and completed a Master's degree in Human Resources Management at George Washington University and is currently the Director of HR and Administration at the high tech company, Excalibur Technologies, in Tysons Corner. Nancy read about PVS in the Washington Post article in 1990 and was surprised to learn Ray was part of that august group when she met him in June of that year. Ray and Nancy add at least 1 or 2 new countries to the "been there" list every year but Nancy claims that her paltry list of 30 countries pales by comparison to others in PVS. Low altitude issues aside, Whistler/Blackcomb tops the list of favorite ski areas but "there are so many places and so little time!" After 25 years of skiing, ("you'd think I'd get beyond intermediate eventually") Nancy looks forward to many more years skiing and socializing with PVS.
