COOK'S CORNER

HAPPY NEW YEAR to all PVS&E'rs. Several good recipes have been in the wings waiting their turn front and center. A few are published now. In

February, there will be more to come. Your cook has resolved to be more diligent in 1996.

HOT VIRGINIA DIP Janet Marx

Saute and reserve:

- 1 cup pecans
- 2 teaspoons butter/margarine

Mix together thoroughly:

- 16 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 4 Tablespoons milk
- 5 oz. dried beef, minced
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 cup sour cream
- 4 teaspoons onion, minced

Place in 1-1/2 quart baking dish. Top with pecans. Chill until serving time. Bake at 350° for 20 minutes. Cream until fluffy: Serve with hot crackers or small break - 1 cup butter/margarine sticks.

WILD RICE & ARTICHOKE HEART SALAD Janet Marx

Cook and cool:

- 1 cup uncooked wild rice (3 cups cooked)

Drain:

- 2 (7-1/2 oz.) jars marinated artichoke hearts, packed in oil *** (Drain oil from one jar.)

Combine above with:

- 3 tomatoes, diced
- 1 (8 oz.) can sliced water chestnuts, drained
- 1 (4 oz.) can mushrooms, drained

Pour over mixture, stirring well: - 1 cup bottled Italian dressing Marinate overnight in refrigerator. Drain before serving. Serve chilled.

WILD RICE TURKEY SALAD Janet Marx

Cook and cool:

- 2/3 cup uncooked wild rice (2 cups uncooked)

In large bowl, mix well:

- 2/3 cup mayonnaise
- 1/3 cup milk
- 2 Tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 small onion, grated or minced

Stir in rice and the following:

- 3 cups cubed cooked turkey
- 1 (8 oz.) can sliced water chestnuts, drained

Refrigerate mixture.

Just before serving add the following:

- 1/2 lb. seedless green grapes, halved (about 2 cups)
- 1 cup cashew nuts
- Salt and pepper, to taste

Spoon onto platter lined with lettuce leaves. Garnish with:

- Lemon slices (optional)

TOFFEE SQUARES Liz Triau

- 1 cup packed brown sugar

Beat in:

- 1 egg yolk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Stir in:

- 2 cups flour

Spread thinly in 9 X 13 pan. Bake at 350° for 15-20 minutes.

- 6 oz. semisweet chocolate. Spread on warm cookie surface.

Sprinkle with:

- 1 cup chopped nuts

Cut into squares when cool.
