> BRANDY/WALNUT PATE Marilyn Clark (from Janet Waln)

Mix together well and let sit in refrigerator overnight so that flavors can mingle:

- /2 cup finely chopped English walnuts
- 1 (4-1/2 oz.) can Underwood deviled ham
- 1 (4-1/2 oz.) can Underwood roast beef
- 2 Tablespoons soft butter or oleo
- 2 Tablespoons good Brandy
- Snipped parsley for garnish

Serve on plain crackers. The Pate was served at the November meeting and was devoured.

COUNTRY FRESH CORN CHOWDER

In 3-quart heavy saucepan, cook until crisp:

- 4 strips bacon

Remove bacon, crumble and set aside.

To bacon drippings, add and saute until tender:

- 1 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 cup chopped celery

Add and simmer until tender:

- 1-1/2 cups finely diced potatoes
- 2 cups water
- 1 teaspoon granulated chicken bouillon
- Salt and pepper to taste

Combine and stir until smooth: - 1/4 cup flour - 2 cups milk

Add to vegetables and cook until chowder thickens slightly, stirring frequently.

Add:

- 8 -

1 (16 oz.) package Yellow Sweet Corn
1 cup light cream
8 oz. processed cheese, cubed

Heat until cheese is melted and soup is hot. Serves 6 - 8.

<u>CARAMEL APPLE PIE</u> Nancy Garrett

Preheat oven to 375*.

Defrost and set aside: - 1 (12 oz.) package Stoffer's Escalloped Apples

In a mixing bowl combine:

- 6 oz. cream cheese, softened - 1 egg
- 1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla
- 3 Tablespoons sugar
- 1 Tablespoon flour

Spread above mixture over: - 1 (6 oz.) graham cracker pie crust

Place in refrigerator for a few minutes to set cream cheese mixture.

Combine: - Defrosted apples from above

- 1/3 cup caramel topping**
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Gently spoon mixture over cream cheese layer taking care to keep two distinct layers. Bake for 40-45 minutes or until apples bubble up around edge of pie crust. Serve at room temperature. Promptly store leftover pie in refrigerator.

**To make the caramel topping, place 8-9 caramels in glass cup. Add 2 teaspoons water. Microwave 2 minutes, on high, stirring after one minute.
