Take a left at 3d traffic light on Georgetown Pike (2 mi) to next traffic light. Right on Walker Road (1.1 mi) to Squires Trail. Left on Squires Trail to end of dirt road. Left on Haven Lane to 525 (left of cul-de-sac)

From McLean - Arlington. North on Old Dominion Drive (from Charlie's Place) and continue as above on Old Dominion.

TIDEWATER PICNIC & BARBECUE AT THE MCGRATHS - JUNE 26. 11:30 A.M.

Limited to 30, this event is waitlisted. Be sure and call coordinator Karen Felker (703)931 - 6843 if you must cancel and to check on what to bring . Directions:

For Virginia/DC residents. Take Interstate 95 South just past Fredericksburg to the Massaponax Rte 1 and 17 Exit. (Old exit 44). At the exit lane traffic light take a right, go to next traffic light and take a left onto VSH 17 to Tappahannock. 47 miles later, on mostly four lane highway, take a left at the first traffic light in Tappahannock onto VSH 360 to Warsaw. (You'll be crossing over the Rappahannock River). Go through Warsaw. Just past a 7-11 store the highway splits, VSH 360 to the left towards Callao and VSH 3 to the right towards Kilmarnock and White Stone. Go right on VSH 3 towards Kilmarnock. Go 16 miles to a right turn onto VSH 354. Proceed 14 miles to THE END OF THE HIGHWAY. When you see water in front and to the right, proceed left onto VSH 1050 (watch for marker with our name on it) for 200 yards then turn right into a culdesac. Our home is on the left. Total mileage is about 125 with an elapsed time of about 2 and 1/2 hours.

<u>For Maryland/DC residents</u>. Leave the Beltway at the Branch Avenue South Exit (Route 5) towards Waldorf. Join Route 301 South through La Plata and over the Potomac River to a left onto VSH 3. Proceed through Oak Grove and Montross to Warsaw. (About 33 miles) As you're coming into Warsaw, you'll pass a lumber yard and a Levi Strauss plant on your right. Take the very next left for about 1/4 mile to a STOP sign. Take a left onto VSH 360, proceed just past a 7-11 store to where the highway splits, VSH 360 to the left to Callao and VSH 3 to the right towards Kilmarnock and White Stone. Go right on VSH 3 towards Kilmarnock. Go 16 miles to a right turn onto VSH 354. . and then proceed as above. (Mileage and time as above).

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COOK'S CORNER

#### Nancy Garrett

The Spring Dinner was planned by Marilyn Clark and Karen Felker, both outstanding cooks. Their recipes are provided for

you to try. Most can be prepared ahead of time and reheated just prior to serving. Dessert served at the dinner was CHARLOTTE RUSSE, found on page 4 of the PVS Cookbook.

#### PITA CHIPS

Preheat oven to slow (300°). Lightly coat 2 or 3 baking sheets with nonstick vegetable oil cooking spray.

 1 package (8 oz.) small whole-wheat pita breads per topping

Cut each pita into 4 wedges. Gently cut or pull each wedge apart to form a total of 64 triangles per package. Reserve.

#### GARLIC TOPPING:

In small bowl, combine: - 1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley - 2 egg whites, lightly beaten - 1/4 cup olive oil - 3 small cloves garlic, finely chopped - 1/2 teaspoon coarse salt

#### CHEESE TOPPING

In small bowl, combine:

- 1 cup grated parmesan cheese
- 2 egg whites, lightly beaten
- 1/4 cup olive oil

Spoon some of the topping onto the rough side of each triangle. Place triangles topping-side up, in single layer on baking sheets. Bake 15-18 minutes or until edges of triangles are toasted and topping is set. Cool chips on baking sheets on wire racks.

Both kinds of chips can be prepared up to 8 hours in advance. To recrisp, place in a very slow oven (250°) for 10-15 minutes.

#### BAKED CHICKEN MARSALA

-6 whole boneless, skinless chicken breasts

Pound flat between waxed paper to produce 12 pieces chicken scallopine.

Roll chicken in Italian bread crumbs. Place chicken in greased shallow ovenproof dish. Pour 1/2 cup Marsala wine over all. Cover and bake 45 min. to 1 hour at 350°.

#### SUNSHINE CARROTS

 6 medium carrots, sliced on the bias, about 1-inch thick
Cook until tender and drain.

In small saucepan, combine:

- 1 Tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1/4 cup orange juice

Cook, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and bubbles. Boil 1 minute. Stir in:

- 2 Tablespoons butter or margarine

Pour mixture over hot carrots, tossing gently to coat evenly. Can be made day ahead and gently reheated.

#### CURRIED POTATOES

Bring medium-size saucepan of water to boiling. Add:

 3 large (2 lbs.) potatoes, pared and cut into 3/4-inch cubes

Cook about 6 minutes. Drain potatoes.

Heat large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add:

- 1 teaspoon cumin seeds
Cook until toasted, about 4 minutes.
Remove from skillet and reserve.

In same skillet, heat:

- 1 teaspoon vegetable oil Add and saute until browned, about 3 min.:

- 1 small onion, finely chopped Add:

- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped, pared fresh ginger
- 1 teaspoon curry powder
- 1/3 cup frozen peas
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- Drained potatoes
- Reserved cumin seeds

Saute, turning potatoes gently for about 3 minutes or until heated through. Can be prepared a day ahead and refrigerated, covered. Serve at room temperature, or gently reheated.
