The Gardens feature over 750 varieties of azaleas, and many of them were in full bloom for our tour.

It is a rare occasion when you get to see some of nature's finest flower colors and then top that off with Rachel's own creative use of color in her paintings.

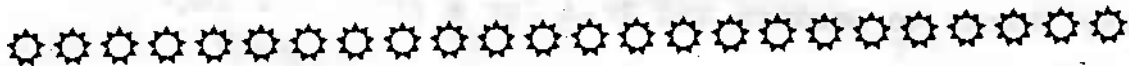
SPRING FLING, April 27th - by John Matthews

Over twenty PVS'ers and guests attended the 1997 Spring Fling sponsored by the Blue Ridge Ski Council at the University of Maryland. Merchandise and trips were donated by vendors and resorts for auctioning off for the benefit of handicapped athletes.

The event began with a two hour long "silent auction". In one of the large meeting rooms, four large tables were arrayed with a variety of merchandise and events, ranging from ski socks to top quality parabolic skis, to short trips. Bids were written on a form near each item; bids were subject to overtopping by later bidders.

The largest table displayed about 80 items of clothing, including T-shirts, ski jackets, gloves, hats and sweat shirts. Skis, boots, poles, ski and boot bags, goggles and related items were arranged on a second table. A third table stretched the length of two long walls and displayed about 75 pieces of artwork, ranging in size from 8 x 10 inches to about three by four feet. A fourth table posted a variety of mini-trips and vacations ranging from three days of sailing at Marblehead, Massachusetts to day-skiing at nearby resorts. Several of our members picked up good merchandise bargains by submitting winning bids for parabolic skis, ski bags, ski poles and small artwork.
