
DIRECTIONS to Hensley home in Arlington, Virginia:


From Route I66: Take North Glebe Rd exit and follow about three miles to a right on 36th Street. From there on, follow above directions.

COMING EVENTS

MAY 25 - HIKE IN SHENANDOAH NATIONAL PARK

Saturday, May 25th. 8:00 A.M. (Rain date: Sunday May 26th.) WHEN:

Cedar Run/White Oak Canyons - two of the most SPECTACULAR ravines in the park; waterfalls and cascades in ABUNDANCE! LOTS of effort but worth it!

Tell leaders Bob and Jan Marx which YOU will be doing at hike time. Three options:

Hi-test: Strong hikers, in good condition, will go UP Cedar Run; ACROSS the top, and DOWN White Oak Canyon; approximately 8.2 miles and 4,600 vertical feet!

Regular: Good hikers will go up AND down White Oak Canyon; approximately 5.3 miles (shorter) but still 3,000 vertical feet.

Leisure: A short 3 mile round trip of 1,400 vertical feet lets you see the lower falls in White Oak Canyon; tree-shaded pools, a pace you set for yourself and your buddy make for a grand outing.

Wear: Sturdy shoes/boots; appropriate clothes for the weather.

Bring: Lunch, water, lots of gorp (or YOUR favorite trail nibble). Also, refreshments (in the car) for your relief at hike's end.

8:00 a.m. at Cooper School (one block INSIDE the beltway on Time: Georgetown Pike, Virginia Exit 13); carpools will be arranged at the school.

Reservations: Please call Jan or Bob Marx (703-451-9158) by Thursday, May 23rd, so we don't leave Cooper School without YUU. (If you want to meet at the trailhead, call Jan or Bob for directions and required arrival time.)

Turn right onto Painted Daisy Drive (watch for speed bumps on this street!) and proceed to 7853 near end on right. There is NO PARKING along Painted Daisy curbs. This month features a few of the delicious offerings of Fumiko Marquardt - from meetings at her home,

after-trip parties, and many other PVS occasions. Between the many travels that Fumiko and Myron are now taking, both in this country and abroad (especially to Japan) Fumiko was finally able to provide the following recipes for us all to try.

MUSHROOM-GARLIC ROUNDS

Preheat oven to 400°. Cut into four 1½ inch circles:

- 6 slices white or whole wheat bread

Brush one side of bread circles with:
- 2 Tablespoons melted margarine

Place buttered sides down on ungreased baking sheet. Bake until light brown, about 5 minutes.

Cook and stir adding in order:

- 1 Tablespoon margarine

- 10 medium mushrooms, very finely chopped (About 1½ cups)

- ½ teaspoon garlic salt

Spread about ½ teaspoon mushroom mixture on unbuttered side of each bread circle. Cover and refrigerate up to 24 hours. 15 minutes prior to serving, heat oven to 350°. Garnish each round with small piece of pimento. Bake about 4 minutes.

SHRIMP MOUSSE

In medium saucepan, combine:

- 1 can (10-3/4 oz.) condensed cream of shrimp soup
- ½ cup water
- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1 teaspoon black pepper

Let stand for 10 minutes. Stir over low heat till gelatin is dissolved.

With rotary beater, beat into mixture:

- ½ cup cottage cheese
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- ½ cup plain yogurt
- 1 Tablespoon lemon juice

Into soup mixture fold:

- 1 package (6 oz.) frozen cooked shrimp, thawed and finely chopped (Set aside a few whole shrimp for garnish)
- 4 hard cooked eggs, finely chopped
- 2 Tablespoons sliced green onion

Turn mixture into 6-cup mold. Chill until firm. Unmold just before serving. Garnish with:

- Hard cooked egg yolk, sieved
- Hard cooked egg white, sieved

- Fresh dill

Serve with party rye or crackers. Makes 24 rounds.

CHOCOLATE CHIP CHEESECAKE

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine:

- 2 cups finely crushed creme-filled chocolate sandwich cookies (approximately 24 cookies)
- 1 cup shortening, melted (e.g. Crisco)

Press firmly into bottom of 9-inch springform pan.

In large bowl, beat until fluffy:

- 3 (8 oz.) packages softened cream cheese

Gradually beat in the following, beating until smooth after each addition:

- 1 (14 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk
- 3 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla

Toss together and add to cheese mixture:

- ½ cup mini chocolate chips
- 1 teaspoon flour

Pour mixture into crumb lined pan. Sprinkle over top:

- ½ cup mini chocolate chips

Bake 55 minutes or until center is set. Let cool and chill before serving.
