### A LURID TALE

Peregrinating Charles Farwell recently returned from trekking in Nepal Reporting in the Maryland Medical Journal, he describes a harrowing encounter with leech. For the benefit of PVSers who might someday find themselves in similar circumstances, the following excerpts from Charlie's article are printed:

I asked a number of people about the best defense against leeches. I was told that I should keep my trousers tucked in my socks, that it was unlikely that insect repellents would work (as repellents probably only worked against mosquitos and other flying insects), and that if a leech were to attach itself to me, I should touch a lighted eigarette to the back of the leech in order to make it release its bite. So when the heavy rains came unexpectedly to the area in which my colleagues and I were trekking and leeches appeared literally by the millions, we found ourselves with virtually no defenses.

The leeches ranged in size from about one quarter inch to six inches. They were as thin as a matchstick before they sucked our blood and as swollen as a cigarette after. If I have nightmares, I know the villains will be those whitish creatures! They would inch up our shoes, legs, and bodies. I found one full of blood on my head. Evolution has been so successful in preparing them for their bloodsucking that it was rare that we could feel by touch when they crawled over our skin. Only by sight could we find them. Frequently, there were thirty or more on each of us at any instant. We were pulling off thousands of them in a few hours. My guide, who

was Nepalese and had holes in his shoes, was bleeding profusely and was slushing blood in his socks. My own socks were also soaked with blood. Even after we removed the leeches from our bodies, we continued to bleed for one-half hour or longer. It was so hot that if we kept our trousers on,

we just poured sweat, but trousers did offer some leech protection. If we took our trousers off, we got leeches up and down our exposed legs, although we were a little cooler—it seemed hopeless.

It was going to take more than one hour to get out of the leech area. We were in Nepal, between Dhamdus and Nuanda, more or less 100 miles west of Katmandu. In desperation, the thought occurred to me—what do I have to lose by using my insect repellent that I was carrying for mosquitoes and flying insects? The leeches withered, twisted, and fell off when touched by Jungle Juice by REI, and we began to smear it on over clothes and shoes. The leeches would now climb up on our shoes and fall away, and we experienced a great sense of relief.

Very rare.

We arrived at Great Falls in time to see the locks being opened for the passage of the barge down the canal after which, despite a slight sprinkle, we continued on our way to attack the Billy Goat Trail from the north end. After lunch on the rocks we proceeded to scale the awesome boulders bordering the raging river. Here we suddenly came upon John Newdorp whom we had lost at Great Falls an hour before but now, through some Newdorp sleigh-of-hand, was far ahead of us. As we caught up with him we nearly lost Ken Evans who had a bad fall but courageously limped on. (Xrays later showed a hairline fracture in the knee area.) Eventually, our blue-blazed trail disappeared in the swampy flood waters and after much floundering we beat our way out to the tow path and thence to trail's end at Angler's Inn where we all pronounced the day a great adventure despite the ups and downs. #### IN MEMORIAM

Ex-PVSer . Jenckes Mason died after a stroke on April 25. He was 88 years old and for pratically all his life had been an outdoorsman -hiking, camping, climbing,

exploring, skiing and, of course, working his job in the Forest Service.

I first met and skied with Jenckes on a Grasley-led trip to Norway in 1970. After that it was Val d'Isère, Mont Bondone, Poland, Zurs, Cervin, a, La Plagne, on and on, through the years. The very names conjure 'up memories of shared trails and spills and thrills and the oh-so-welcome après hours. Until, already in his 80's, Jenckes finally hung up the skis for good.

But, PVSers best remember Jenckes for the hikes he and Dorothy led in the Virginia mountains followed by incredible feasts at their mountain home near Front Royal where revelers stayed on and on into the night unwilling to say goodnight to such genial hosts.

The first hike I remember was a hot (90 !) sticky, ticky, steep, rocky trek to The Peak in SNP in June 1979. Through all the travails Jenckes kept his cool and his command of the sometimes faint-hearted troops who not only survived but couldn't wait to sign up to follow him again on subsequent hikes - thereafter scheduled for fall foliage time.

Mason hike/dinners ended in 1986 when the mountain retreat was sold. But, in our mind's eye, we still see Jenckes on all those hikes always at the front of a straggling, often disorderly, line and then standing there at a crossroads waiting patiently for the least able to catch up. That's the way we remember Jenckes. Always will.

## ABOUT AIRLINE COUPONS by Charles Huggins

All airlines except TWA have lifted the 2000 mile limit. TWA has the 2000 mile limit only for the month of August. The TOOT-published \$436 coupon price for TWA is still valid as of March 24th and is the best price for skiers or anyone who wishes to fly to the west coast other than during the month of Since TWA is in bankruptcy, I would not advise anyone to hang on to coupons very long as TWA could fold like Eastern. P.S. Amtrak has lowered the age to 62 for seniors. All seniors get 15% off the lowest fare Mondays through Thursdays.
