

GOOK, 2 GOLNEY

Marilyn Clark and I seem to have chosen well on the recipes for the March dinner at the lovely party room at Bette Walkers.

The cooks took home very few left-overs and many of you have requested recipes. A couple of appetizers were printed last month and the cheese puffs the month before. Enjoy with family and friends.

VEAL LOAF

Mix together well:

- 2 pounds chopped (ground) veal
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 1 teaspoon tarragon
- 1/2 cup stock or bouillon
- 1 egg
- 1/3 cup melted butter

Butter a 2-1/2 pint loaf pan and put in veal mixture. Dot the top with 1/2 stick butter and bake in 350° oven for approximately 1 hour. Weight it down slightly while it cools. Remove from pan when cool. Cut into 8-9 slices just before serving. May be served warm or cool delicious either way.

Best if made the night before so flavors can mingle.

BAKED RICE

Mix together:

- 2 cups uncooked long grain rice
- 2 cans beef consommé, undiluted
- 2 cups cold water
- 2 medium onions chopped

Place in greased 11" X 14" casserole. Cut into small pieces and dot across top of casserole:

- 1 stick butter or margarine

Bake at 350° for 1-1/2 hours. (At 45 minutes, stir well.)

For the party, there were variations - some added mushrooms, another added chopped red pepper. All were delicious. This serves 8-10. May be halved for smaller group.

SQUASH CASSEROLE

Mix together in 2 quart casserole:

- 2-3 medium zucchini, cut in 1-inch chunks
- 2-3 medium yellow squash, cut in 1-inch chunks
- 2 medium onions, sliced and separated
- 2-3 large tomatoes, cut in wedges (or use 8-9 cherry tomatoes, halved)
- 15-20 mushrooms, halved or quartered if very large

Mix together and toss well with above mixture:

- 1 Tablespoon beef bouillon crystals, or 3 cubes crushed
- 3 Tablespoons light brown sugar
- 1-2 teaspoons salt
- 1 Tablespoon dried basil
- 1 teaspoon black pepper

Dot top of vegies with:

- 3/4 stick butter or margarine, cut into small pieces

Cover casserole tightly with aluminum foil. Bake in 350° oven for 30-40 minutes. Serves 6-8 generously.

(In the summer, I use a doubled sheet of aluminum foil and wrap vegies. Will cook over hot fire in about 30 minutes.)

BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

Cook and drain:

- 2 (10 oz.) packages frozen chopped broccoli

Add and mix well:

- 3/4 cup chopped pecans
- 2 can water chestnuts, slivered

Place in 2 quart greased baking dish.

Sprinkle across the top of the mixture:

- 1 package onion soup mix

Drizzle over ali:

- 1 stick melted butter or margarine

Cover with:

- 1-2 cups buttered bread crumbs

Bake in 350° oven for 20-30 minutes.

SKIDDING WITH CLIF TAYLOR by George Devorshak and Karen Felker

During a recent trip to Silver Creek and Winter Park, Colorado, Knox and Karen Felker and George and Karen Devorshak witnessed a group of skidding (explanation follows) students seemingly skiing downhill on their boots (no skis). They were all parallel skidding and looked great, despite being in a beginners class. We caught up with their PSIA instructor and found out that they were using skis only about 18 inches long. When we asked if we could "demo" the skis, the PSIA instructor introduced us to Clif Taylor, a pro-ski Hall-of-Famer who has written several books on skiing (or skidding, as Clif talks about it), is credited with developing the "GLM Method" of ski instruction, and designed the small skis that were being used. Clif not only gave the four of us "demo" skis for the day, he also spent about the next eight hours skidding with us, giving us one-on-one instruction and just having fun. The cost; 2 Vodka martinis, each with 3 olives, and dinner at our apartment.

Clif advocates what many consider a radical approach to beginning and intermediate ski instruction based upon the GLM Method, and we found ourselves skidding classic parallel turning on his short skis within minutes. In fact, we were parallel skidding downhill, side-by-side, holding hands, doing the "cha-cha" on our second run with him. When we transitioned back to our "big" skis, we all felt a significant improvement.

For those spending any time in the Silver Creek/Winter Park area, Clif leads a free Monday night seminar at the Inn at Silver Creek during skiing season. Clif is now 71 years old, and skis (or skids as he would call it) as beautifully as anyone we've ever seen. He advocates and demonstrates his 2 second ski lesson (bend your knees and turn your feet) as an alternative to the current dogma of plant your pole, unweigh, shift your weight, etc., etc., etc., and it works great for those who don't want to or can't process and perform all the mental and physical dynamics of skiing turns in less than one second.

Aside from the great skiing conditions we encountered in the area, meeting and skiing with Clif Taylor was a pleasant highlight of our most recent trip to Colorado.
