Spring Dinner got lots of raves. We also heard from a few how hard they had to work. Recipes are a bit long and will be presented one at a time.

## SAVORY PASTRY STRAWS OR PINWHEELS

Preheat oven to 375*:
1 pound (I package) puff pastry (Pepperidge Farms)
Thaw pastry. Use one sheet at a time, Unfold on floured surface. Roll lightly until each section is approximately 4-5 inches and about 10-12 inches long.

Filling for 1 package of pastry:
Mix together:
1/2 pound grated sharp Cheddar cheese
1 teaspoon garlic salt
1/2-1 teaspoon cavenne pepper
Spray pastry with Pam. Place $1 / 4$ of cheese mixture on middle third of pastry. Fold one-third over the middle third. Spray with Pam. Place another $1 / 4$ of the cheese over this section and fold the last over the cheese mixture. You will have 3 layers of pastry enclosing 2 layers of filling. Roll lightly to remove air from the layered pastry.

Cut crosswise to make appoximately 20 -strips, Twist the touft strips gently 2-3 turns and place on cookie sheet sprayed with Pam. Place the straws about 2 inches apart (pinch both ends of the twist down on the cookie sheet). Refrigerate until ready to bake. Repeat with second sheet.

Bake in preheated oven for $15-20$ minutes or until lightly browned. Remove from cookie sheets immediately to cooling rack. Serve at room temperature or reheat briefly just before serving.

## Alternate filling for 1 package of pastry:

1 recipe Pesto Sauce $1 I$ used Super Giant -7 oz . in Cheese section of grocery store) Can used package to mix with olive oil or make from herbs
1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
Garlic Salt
Place one fourth of pesto sauce in middle section of pastry. Sprinkle lightly with garlic salt. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Fold right section of pastry over middle. Place one-fourth of pesto sauce on this section. Sprinkle with Garlic salt and Parmesan Cheese. Fold remaining section over the top. Roll lightly to remove air bubbles. Cut crosswise into approximately 20 strips. Twist the pastry strips two or three turns and place on ungreased cookie sheet about 2 inches apart. Pinch both ends of the twist onto the cookie sheet.
Refrigerate until ready to bake. Repeat with second sheet of pastry.
Bake in preheated oven for $15-20$ minutes or until lightly browned. Remove to cooling rack. Serve at room temperature or pop in oven for quick reheating just prior to serving.
