Go two blocks and turn right at the second traffic light on Glenallen Ave. Follow Glenallen Ave. to Brookside Gardens at the bottom of the hill on the right side. Park on the paved lot in front of the Conservatories.

Directions to the Walns at 6222 Berlee Drive, Alexandria, VA (tel: 703-256-3543): From 395 N & S, exit at Little River Turnpike (West). At first light, go right onto Beauregard. At next light, go left onto North Chambliss. At next light, go left onto Lincolnia. After 0.3 mile go right onto Sano. After the Queen of Apostles Catholic Church, Sano turns into Berlee, the road divides and veers right. The Walns are just past median on left. The number is on the curb and the house which is a light brown brick with dark brown shutters.
