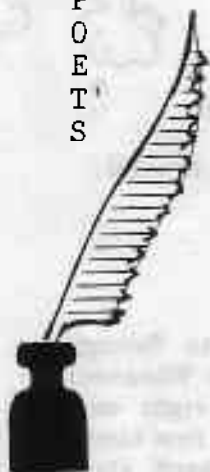

COOK'S CORNER

November is the month when we know that summer's over and ski season is not far behind. The Oktoberfest

was the source of Jean's pate. Couscous Salad is from the Flakes.

COUSCOUS SALAD

Genee Boykin

In wide-bottom saucepan, heat:

- 1/8 cup oil

Add, stirring to coat with the oil:

- 14 oz. box couscous

Pour in:

- 3 1/2 cup chicken stock or water, boiling

Cover and remove from heat for about 5 minutes. Remove cover. Transfer to large bowl and fluff with fork. Allow to cool about 30 minutes before adding vegetables and dressing.

Mix together and set aside:

- 1 1/2 cups chopped tomato (seeds removed)
- 1 1/2 cups chopped cucumber (seeds removed)
- 3/4 cup chopped red onion
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley
- 1/4 cup finely chopped fresh mint
- 1 teaspoon finely minced jalapeno pepper

Mix together and set aside:

- 1/3 cup red wine vinegar
- 2/3 cup olive oil
- 1/4 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Add vegetables and dressing to cooled couscous. Refrigerate several hours, stirring occasionally, until serving time.

EXOTIC WALNUT PATE

Jean Heitchue

Soak in water for 1-2 hours to de-salt:

- 1 cup Feta cheese

Combine in blender or food processor on low and then medium speed:

- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- 3 Tablespoons milk
- 1/3 cup Feta cheese (drained)
- 1/3 cup chopped walnuts

With speed on medium, gradually add:

- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- 5 Tablespoons milk
- 2/3 cups Feta cheese (drained)
- 2/3 cup chopped walnuts
- Dash cayenne (more to taste)
- 1 teaspoon paprika

Blend to a smooth paste. Chill. Serve on crackers, pita bread, or as a dip for raw vegetables.

CRANBERRY-GLAZED BRIE

Myra Evans

Combine in heavy nonaluminum saucepan:

- 3 cups cranberries
- 3/4 cup firmly packed golden brown sugar
- 1/3 cup dried currants
- 1/3 cup water
- 1/8 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/8 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cardamom
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/8 teaspoon ground ginger

Cook over medium-high heat until most of berries pop, stirring frequently, about 5 minutes. Cool to room temperature. (Can be prepared 3 days ahead. Cover and refrigerate.)

- 2.2-pound Brie cheese wheel (8-inch diameter)

Using sharp knife, cut circle in top rind of cheese, leaving 1/2-inch border of rind. Carefully remove center circle of rind from cheese. Do NOT cut through side rind. Place cheese in 8-inch-diameter ceramic baking dish or on cookie sheet lined with foil. Spread cranberry marmalade over. (Can be prepared 6 hours ahead. Cover and refrigerate. Bring cheese to room temperature before continuing.)

Preheat oven to 300°. Bake until soft, about 12 minutes. Cool slightly. Set on large platter. Surround with :

- Crackers
- Apple slices
- Pear slices

Wonderful appetizer or dessert!!!
