The Eclipse Chamber Orchestra

Eclipse is comprised of 22 members from the National Symphony Orchestra, including Elisabeth Adhins the NSO's Assistant Concertmaster. Their Music Director and Conductor is Sylvia Alimena, also a member of the NSO. The Washington Post was effusive in its praise of Eclipse in their Kennedy Center debut, describing the chamber orchestra as "Outright extraordinary...this small but excellent orchestra...communicated strongly and directly with everyone in the auditorium...sheer craftmanship." Additionally, last season Eclipse became the first chamber orchestra ever to be presented by the prestigious Dunbarton Concert Series.

On November 17, the elegant sound of the Eclipse Chamber Orchestra string section is featured, beginning with a grand Concerto Grosso by Handel. Sumptuous Scandinavian melodies then sail through the air in music of Grieg and Sibelius. Eclipse is joined by NSO colleague and Principal Clarinettist, Loren Kitt for the Washington Premiere of the flowing and gently haunting "Pastoral Variations" of Ben Haim. Dag Wiren adds a bit of whimsy to close the delightful program with the joyful melodies of his "Serenade for Strings." The Music Director discusses each work on the program, and afterwards there is a reception and opportunity to meet the musicians.
