#### MIDWEEK HIKE, BLACK HILL REGIONAL PARK, THURSDAY, NOV. 6th

Myron Marquardt will lead the six-mile hike starting at 10:30 a.m. at the Visitors' Center. The hike will be easy as 3/4 of the trail is paved, and only 1/4 will involve a dirt trail down a small hill to the lake. Little Seneca Lake (500 acres) was created as an emergency water supply for the Washington area.

Many migratory birds now make Little Seneca Lake their winter home. Hikers may wish to come a little early and tour the Visitors' Center. Bring your lunch for eating in a covered shelter at completion of the hike.

DIRECTIONS: Take I-270 North to Exit 16, Route 27, Father Hurley Boulevard Damascus. Follow Father Hurley Blvd. to Route 355 and turn north on 355. Travel 0.9 mile north on 355 and then turn left on West Old Baltimore Road for 1.5 miles. Immediately after passing under I-270 is the entrance road to the park on the left. Follow the road to the large parking lot on the right in front of the Visitors' Center.
