This is about what may ve the first PVS See and Ski Trip. The 32-hour flight for Betty Lawrence, Ray McKinley, Nancy Sexton, Jeanne Strickland, Dina Taylor and Bette Walker was broken by stops in Atlanta; LA; Tahiti (where we were serenaded with South Sea Island wusic at 2 am and served champagne before breakfast on leaving); Auckland; and ending in Christchurch on the South Island. New Zealand is a splendid country, wild and wonderful, deserving
 Michener's premise that it is the most beautiful in the world. It is a land of Kiwis: the bird, the fruit and the native, the latter friendly, charming, cheerful, humorous, and helpful. A land where sheep (outnumbering the natives by 55 million) wear woolen coats, horses wear woolen blankets, and deer and cattle roam in the buff. Uur leader, who met us at the plane and stayed with us for the entire trip, was Earl Holliday, an instructor at Wintergreen! Our ski adventure began with a $21 / 2$-hour bus ride over precipitous mountain roads to Mt. Hutt, a ski field (so-called because skiing is above the tree line) so isolated that a doctor is on duty daily, and those who cannot be treated are heli-lifted. Although the runs were somewhat limited, the snow was fine, and the trip down as breathtaking as the trip up.

Next stop Queenstown, a resort city on Lake Wakatipu in the Southern Alps. There we had access to three ski fields. A road-closing blizzard kept us from Cardrona, the most distant and largest field, but Coronet Peak's undulating pistes were suitable for all levels and we took in unparalleled views of valleys, blue lake, and snow-capped peaks.


The remarkable thing about The Remarkables ski field is geting there. An unpaved road snakes up near-vertical mountains, providing unprecedented views--and white knuckles. The area is compact, impeccably groomed, sun-drenched and downright fun to ski - with no lift lines! This was our skiing highlight as we opted not to heliski, and weather prevented the ski-plane trip to the 12 -mile runs on the world-famous Tasman Glacier.
Non-skiing activities were as exciting as the skiing. The exquisite scenery made all excursions a pleasure. Akaroa and Milford Sound and the boat rides at each were especially magnificent. Ray noted, "This doesn't remind me of anything I've ever seen before! It's unique and awesome."

The Shotover River jet boat ride through a narrow, craggy chasm at the speed of sound left us speechless. We were entertained by a sheep herding and shearing demo; visited a kiwi farm; were introduced to deer farming; watched bungy jumping, dined sumptuously in the manor house of a sheep ranch; and shopped till we dropped. Woolens and leathers were at prices too cheap to miss.

Dina's missed August 14 birthday (because of crossing the date line), was celebrated later with champagne and a few of our 80 fellow travelers.

From Auckland we bused past beautifully green, rolling hills to the Waitomo Glow Horm Caves and on to Rotorua, land of geysers, bubbling mud flats and Maris. An evening Maori hangi (feast) ended with an excellent Maori concert.

A stopover in Honolulu for rest and warmth was much appreciated. A 60-cent bus ride around the lush island was capped off by lunch at Turtle Bay Resort. Our trip ended in confusion and missed flights, but all arrived home in time for the Crab Feast, which was propitious, as our hostess was among us.

It is safe to say that we were all exceedingly glad to have made the trip, would encourage everyone to, by all means, go to New Zealand, but if your goal is purely skiing, go west.
