In June, the Walns hosted a lovely Hawaijan Luau complete with palm trees, leis, birds, and a menu that provided a feast both tantalizing to the eye and titillating to the taste. This month's recipes are for the "Pupu s" served prior to dinner. Next month will feature the main course items, salad and dessert.

## COCONUT CURRY SHRIMP DIP

Mix together and chill for several hours or overnight:

- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 teaspoon curry
- 1/2 cup finely chopped coconut
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 finely chopped scallions
- I can (4-弪 0z.) shrimp, drained
- Dash tabasco
- Dash black pepper

Serve with crackers or vegetables.

## PINEAPPLE CHEESE SPREAD

Mix together:

- 2 (8 oz. packages Lite Cream Cheese, softened
- 1 ( 8 -禀 oft.) can crushed pineapple, drained well
- 1-1/2 cups finely chopped pecans (reserve $1 / 2$ cup for garnish)
- $1 / 2$ cup finely chopped green pepper
- 2 Tablespoons minced onion
- l Tablespoon seasoned salt (Janet used Lawry's No Salt Seasoned Salt)

Refrigerate overnight. May be served as spread with pecan garnish or rolled in balls and rolled in pecans. Makes 2 large balls. Serve with crackers.

## LEEK DIP

Mix together well and chill overnight:

- l package Knorr Leek soup mix
- 16 oz . carton sour cream

Serve with crackers and/or veggies.

## LOMI LOMI (Salmon Relish)

Rinse, drain, and flake with fork:

- -3 ( $7-\frac{1}{2}$ cz.) cans boneless, shinless canned salmon


## TERIYAKI BEEF STICKS

In large bow, mix well:

- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 2 Tablespoons sugar
- 1 Tablespoon minced fresh ginger
- 2 cloves garlic, minced or pressed
- 2 Tablespoons dry sherry
- 2 Tablespoons salad oil

Trim all fat and discard from:

- 1-1/2 lbs. boneless Tean sirloin steak about l-inch thick

Cut meat across the grain in $1 / 4$-inch slices. Mix meat with soy marinade. Cover and chill overnight.

Weave thick wooden skewers in and out of meat slices so that meat lies flat. Cook on a grill 3-4 inches above a bed of hot coals, turning meat until brown on both sides (5-7 minutes). Serves 12.

Janet cooked these an hour before guests arrived, re-heating in the microwave for 2 minutes on high before serving. She tripled the recipe for the Luau.

In a glass serving bowl, place in 2-3 layers:

- Flaked salmon
- 3 plum tomatoes, chopped
- 4 scallions, finely chopped

Serves 25-30 as a relish or "side" salad.
From the Steak and Swim, by request:

> Genee Boykin

Place in food processor, using plastic blade, blend until smooth:

- 1 (16 oz.) can chickpeas, drained (reserve liquid to thin mixture)
- 1 clove garlic
- 3 Tablespoons Tahini (sesame seed paste) Stir paste well before measuring.
- 5 Tablespoons lemon juice
- Cumin to taste
- 1/4 - 1/2 cup good olive oil (Use just enough to keep mixture together.)

Pour into oval-shaped flat dish. Sprinkle with olive oil and lemon. Garnish with black olives and parsley. Serve with pita bread cut into small wedges. Serves 10-15.
