

If you don't have a computer, no doubt you know someone who does. Currently this is an "open" site meaning anyone can access it. However, it you don't know the magic URL given above, chances are nobody else will. But just to be on the safe side, we will be circumspect in reporting news and names on the Web site. So far there has been very favorable comment about the site from both local and out-of-town PVS members. To see these comments, go to the *Guest Register* on the *home page* and click on *view entries*.

Feel free to submit photos and other items for posting on the Web site. These can be submitted by e-mail {marvin.hass@erols.com or write an entry in the *Guest Register*} or by "snail" mail {Marvin Hass, 309 Yoakum Pkwy, Apt. 605, Alexandria, VA 22304-3923}. Photos can be submitted as image files (try to keep size to around 50kB) or as prints. As a guideline, photos associated with week long PVS trips will be limited to six, photos associated with local day events limited to two, and those associated with non-PVS events will be limited to one. The structure and content of the Web site are undergoing constant revision. However, it will be responsive to the wishes of the members subject to limitations on the time of the webmaster, which is the primary reason for limitations on number of photos. It does take some care and effort to prepare material in the proper form. We do have a number of enthusiastic photographers in PVS and we do have viewers who enjoy seeing good photos of PVS events. If you would like to post additional photos, then the webmaster suggests you create your own Web site at homestead (easy to do) or on other server. A hyperlink on the PVS Web site can be inserted to provide access to any member's personal Web site containing additional photos and other information.

There also is a PVS page on the Blue Ridge Ski Council (BRSC) Web site with the URL of http://www.skicouncil/pvs.htm This Web page is listed with that of the other Clubs associated with BRSC and is primarily designed to let other skiers in the area know of the existence of PVS. In the future, this Web page can contain announcements of PVS trips that would be open to nonmembers (subject to approval of trip leader).

Comments by viewers of the Web site are welcomed as well as by others. Just leave a message on the Guest Register or send an e-mail directly.

For those members who do not now have Internet access and feel left out of things, bear in mind that a good fraction of the US population does have access one way or another. The costs of computers have come way down and even free Internet access is available.
