FOUNDED: 1933 **PURPOSE:** To provide a bit of the history of this long-running institution.

As a boy of 13, Max Blob and his family, emigrated from Vogenberg, Germany (near Passau, in Bavaria), in 1896. Max was the oldest of three sons born to Katherine and Phillip Blob. His brothers were John and Henry. They settled on 150 acres of open farm land and woods in Jessup, Maryland. About 10 years later, they built the farm house that Max lived in the remainder of his life and is still occupied with family members. A small building containing a bowling alley was added to the property in 1925. On Sundays, Max would take a truck to the Baltimore ethnic community and bring back some friends for dancing, dining and bowling. In 1933, when prohibition ended, he opened "Blob's Park" for business. In 1942, Katherine and John Eggerl, Max's niece and her husband, moved in with him to help him run the farm and business. The Eggerls had 5 children and as they came of age, they too became involved.

Uncle Max, as most people called him, died February 1969, but the Eggerl family continued to operate the business. As a matter of fact, as the Eggerl children married and had children, Blob's Park began drawing on a third generation of employees. Katherine Eggerl, who remarried after her husband died and became Katherine Peters, cooked most of the food and presided as hostess until shortly before her death in April at the age of 89. Before her death, she arranged to sell the hall and the farmland surrounding it to developers.
