Take 3rd right off of circle (Western Ave) and go 2 miles to the next traffic circle (Westmoreland Circle). Go 3/4 of the way around and get off on Massachusetts Ave toward Washington, DC. In Remembrance

Service for Bob Marx

People gathered some 200 strong to honor Bob Marx's life at the Springfield Christian Church on October 10th, 2009. Many braved long distances and complicated travel plans to be present. One after another the speakers described the attributes which identified Bob and the interests and activities that consumed his days. "We knew that he loved his family," said a long time co-worker. Another, reading from Bob's Caring Bridge website, noted that Bob made no mention of his 36 years with the Census Bureau. He wrote only of his family. Jan's brother Keith acknowledged the enormity of the loss but offered reassurance that Bob's memory would continue in our lives.

Bob's younger son Brian spoke from his heart when he told the congregation that his father was his motor. An accomplished wood artisan, Brian learned from his dad the importance of doing a job right. There were many projects that they worked on together. In recent years, Bob helped Brian paint the interior and exterior of two houses and assisted in installing an elaborate drainage system in one of the yards. Brian's wife Tanya offered some insight into Bob's philosophies. "Regarding his fashion sense," said Tanya, "Bob's approach was to decide on an outfit and stick with it." This explains the red shirt, black pants, and Santa Claus suspenders that he wore each Christmas. His views about children were equally straight forward. "Never interrupt a child when they're talking," said Tanya, and "let children lead." "His basic rule of life was to love unconditionally no matter what." Tanya told of Bob's penchant for picture taking. She recounted a 3 week family trip to Spain in 1998 in which Bob took a mere 1400 photos using only 37 rolls of film. This was not entirely surprising to PVS since Bob had delightfully captured so many of its trips and events over the years with his wonderful cameras.

Tanya was followed by the smallest and perhaps the youngest speaker on record. In an unscripted moment, Tanya's and Brian's 5 year old son Geordie requested a turn. Brian carried him up to the microphone. In a strong and unflinching voice Geordie told the congregation that he liked playing with his grandpa in the sandbox very much and that he wanted him to come back and play again. As Jan later said, "there wasn't a dry eye."

Three of Bob's coworkers from the Census Bureau spoke glowing of his work there. They told of how Bob was the first to envision a system of computerized digital maps. In what was an impossibly short period of time and with Bob at the helm, the Bureau converted from a manual approach to maps to digital techniques used in the 1990 census. Bob also introduced the acronym TIGER for the new system. TIGER is the basis for the private companies that provide us with such references as MapQuest and GPS.

The Club's own Ray McKinley was the final speaker. Ray estimated that there were about 50 PVS members (actually 62) and 8 ex-Club presidents present. "This speaks to the effect Bob had on people." "The most significant thing about Bob was his demeanor," said Ray. "He never lost his temper." To emphasize this Ray described Bob's leadership when the club decided to have sweatshirts. "They had to be purple and they needed to have zippers. Bob was a rock." "Bob's first job in PVS," continued Ray "was the kind that requires a senior executive. It was to do the layout, printing, stapling and mailing of TOOT. Talk about TIGER, this involved enormous skill and Bob volunteered to do it."

After the service, people adjourned to the nearby reception hall for refreshments and fellowship. Later Jan said that she had hoped for more time for PVSers to comment if they had wished. She felt that the service had been wonderful adding, "It was so good to see everyone".

(The Club made a donation to the National Marrow Donor Program in Bob's name. Bob and Jan had received a grant from the Program to help with drugs and housing.)

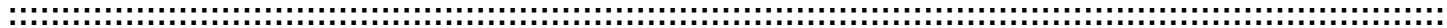

PFLAUMENKUCHEN from Jan Marx
 1 unbaked pie shell
 1 ½ lbs Italian/prune plums
 ½ C sugar
 Wash, halve and pit prunes. Toss in sugar to coat.
 Arrange decoratively in crust.
Topping:
 1 egg
 1/3 to ½ C. sugar (depending on tartness of fruit)
 2 ½ T. flour
 Cinnamon, (salt) squirt of lemon juice

Bake: at 400 for 15 minutes. Reduce to 350 and
 bake 45 minutes longer or until golden on top and

BRSC Fall Meeting, October 17

The Blue Ridge Ski Council (BRSC) is an association of ski clubs from MD, VA, and DC. PVS is one of the 29 clubs in the Council. The fall meeting was held at the Tysons Corner Crowne Plaza and PVS was represented by Dottie Villers, Rosemary Schwartzbard, and David Lerner.

Old business included the earlier promise of BRSC to provide credit reports on tour operators for member clubs. Wayne Homens, the BRSC president, reported that the costs would be prohibitive. The best available alternative appears to be tracking payments by tour operators to providers. This provides only partial protection for clubs, but it may avoid the total default that was encountered last season.

Dues payment by member clubs was reviewed. This amounts to \$0.15 per member for PVS. We paid the dues at the spring meeting but the payment had not been correctly recorded.

The major business of the meeting was the review and approval of proposals for the 2011 Western Carnival and the 2011 Eurofest. Proposals for the Western Carnival were provided for destinations of Snowmass and Park City. Proposals from Group Trips Unlimited, Sportours, and Winter Ski and Sport were evaluated. Park City is the selected destination. The dates are February 5-12. Group Trips Unlimited is the winning tour operator. The Eurofest bids were for Courmayeur, Italy with an alternate destination included with each bid. The bidders were Group Trips Unlimited and Ski Europe. The bid by Ski Europe to the alternate destination of the Aosta Valley, Italy was the winner. Trip dates will be March 10 or 11 to March 19 or 20, depending on the travel dates selected by the individual clubs.

There was a brief discussion about a group purchase of low-cost helmets. Snell approved ski helmets are available for \$17 each from www.prorider.com. However, shipping costs will exceed the price of the helmet for individual purchases. There is a special offer for free shipping on an order for 10 helmets.

The spring 2010 meeting will be at Solomons Island, MD at the end of April or the beginning of May depending on facility availability.

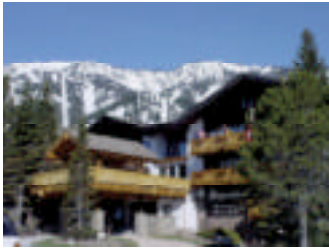

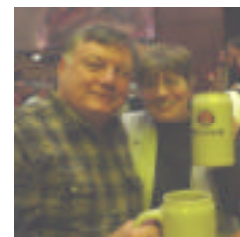

TRAVEL ALERT



Be aware that there are new travel requirements that you will have to comply with for the upcoming ski season. Under a new program, "Secure Flight", the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) requires the following:

1. When making flight reservations, you must provide your exact name as it appears on the ID you use to get on a flight, which means either a passport or driver's license. This will present no problem if your passport and driver's license are issued in the form you normally use when traveling.
2. You must also provide your date of birth and gender when buying tickets.

TSA has built in some flexibility for the near future but you should strive to obtain consistency between the name on your ID and travel documents.
