From Key Bridge - Go left onto M Street. After ½ mile keep to right, street name changes to Foxhall Road. Go 2 miles until it ends at Nebraska Avenue. Go left on Nebraska. Take 1st right onto Indian Lane. Take 1st left onto Rockwood Pkwy. Take 3nd right onto Tilden Street. Take 2nd left onto 51st Street. Look for 4040 51st Street.

From Chain Bridge – Take right onto Canal Road. Take 1st left onto Arizona Avenue. Arizona Avenue ends at Loughboro Road. Go left on Loughboro Road. Take 1st right onto Glenbrook Road. Take 2nd left onto Rockwood Parkway. Take 2nd right onto Tilden Street. Take 2nd left onto 51st Street. Look for 4040 51st Street.

From the inner loop of the Beltway (495) – Take the MD-190/River Road exit, exit 39, toward Washington/Potomac. Merge onto River Road/MD-190E via exit 39B toward Washington. Continue on River Road approx 3.7 miles. Turn right at Little Falls Pkwy. Little Falls Pkwy ends at Massachusetts Avenue. Turn left onto Massachusetts Avenue. Turn right at 3rd light onto 49th Street. Take 3rd right onto Upton Street. Take 2nd left onto 51st Street. Look for 4040 51st Street.

From the outer loop of the Beltway (495) – Merge onto MD-190E/River Road via exit 39 toward Washington. Continue on River Road approx 3.7 miles. Turn right at Little Falls Pkwy. Little Falls Pkwy ends at Massachusetts Avenue. Turn left onto Massachusetts Avenue. Turn right at 3rd light onto 49th Street. Take 3rd right onto Upton Street. Take 2nd left onto 51st Street. Look for 4040 51st Street.

Response for the Jackson Hole trip has been terrific! We now have 38 people going and the trip is filled. If you missed the boat (or plane in this case) and didn't get your application in, you can add your name to the waiting list.

Slope side accommodations are at the Alpenhof Lodge, a cozy Bavarian style lodge with ski in ski out access. There are five of six days lift tickets included (seniors over 65 can deduct \$100). Go on an optional trip over the Teton Pass to Grand Targhee where "the snow comes from heaven not hoses". Cross country skiers have trails outside the front door or options to ski in Grand Teton National Park and Grand Targhee. The trip begins at Dulles, then goes to Jackson, Wy, then a short bus ride to the "Hole". We have a welcome reception of gluwein and fondue.

Full buffet breakfasts are included every day at the hotel. Two group dinners are included, pre and post trip parties, and two après ski gatherings. A short bus trip into the town of Jackson reveals many opportunities for shopping, dining, touring, skiing, and reliving history in a true western town. Yellowstone N.P. is 60 miles north accessible by snowmobile or snowcoach, and a visit to the nearby National Elk Refuge will give you the opportunity to see a herd of 12,000-15,000 elk in winter.

Alaska-Wildlife and Scenery by Barbara Leonhardt:

While Fred and his sister did a nostalgia tour from MD to Maine to visit places they knew as children, my brother and I spent 2+ weeks in Alaska. A tour guide in Alaska <Rainbowmountainadventures.com> created a custom itinerary for us, based on what we wanted to see and do, and then made ALL of our reservations including lodging. She prepared a 2-in thick tour book for us with maps, directions, times, and details about everything on route. We put 2000+ miles on the rental car and took: 2 long train trips, two 9-hr cruises to glaciers and views of lots of sea life, an all day bus trip



90 mi. into Denali National Park where we saw lots of wildlife, a flight to a remote lake to watch bears feeding on salmon, and a scenic flight back over glaciers and lakes, a 2-hr trek on a glacier with a guide, a boat trip to a cove/artist haven for dinner, a car ferry trip, and a 2-hr Mt. McKinley scenic flight. In our "spare" time, we hiked to glaciers, drove through the Wrangell Mountains, and did all sorts of other sightseeing. We



enjoyed staying in log cabins or B&Bs with hosts, including an Iditarod dog musher and a mountain adventurer. Most of our lodgings were off the beaten path, and had incredible views. I took over 1600 photos and now face the task of dealing with them.

Robert Wyman Marx August 27, 1942 - September 7, 2009

The Club lost a wonderful friend in September. After spending 5 months in Minnesota (MN) where Bob with his devoted wife Jan had gone to receive a bone marrow transplant, Bob succumbed to complications of graft versus host disease (GVHD). Long viewed as one of the pillars of PVS, news of Bob's death has greatly saddened fellow Club members.

On the Caring Bridge website where individuals can chronicle their medical progress for family and friends, Bob wrote in mid June "I'm 66, married 44 years to my marvelous soul mate Janet. We have two grown sons (Eric and Brian) who, with their spouses, have provided 8 wonderful grandchildren...Life is good."

Bob was diagnosed with MDS or myelodysplastic syndrome in April '08 after an abnormal blood count. Although MDS is not well understood, a successful bone marrow transplant offers hope of a cure. The University of MN has one of the world renowned bone marrow transplant programs. Its reputation combined with the fact that Bob and Jan both hail from MN, led them to seek treatment there. A non-related healthy donor was identified through the National Marrow Donor Program.

Bob received an infusion of donor bone marrow cells on April 30th. In the days preceding the transplant, a combination of radiation and chemotherapy were used to ready his body for the new cells. In the weeks that followed, Bob and Jan were able to move from the hospital to a nearby apartment. Bob wrote on the Caring Bridge site of walking increasing distances, sightseeing (Guthrie Theater, MN Science Museum), and visiting with relatives. In mid July Jan took a long weekend at the family cabin while son Brian took over care giving duties temporarily. In late July symptoms of GVHD (a process in which donor cells attack recipient cells) increased. This development and the consequences of its treatment proved to have too great a toll. Bob passed away on September 7th with family and friends by his side.

For 42 years Bob and Jan shared their gentle spirits, good will, and thoughtfulness with PVS. Regardless of the nature of the event, their presence always added. They actually met as members of their University of MN ski club (Skeewaksurs) while in college. Skeewaksurs offered canoeing, white water rafting, and winter skiing. Bob graduated in 1964 with a degree in Geography. He and Jan married in 1965, moving to the DC area a year later as Bob started work at the Census Bureau. He would become Chief of the Geography Division in 1983, a position he would hold until his retirement in 2003. In the 1980's his division orchestrated the development of a major new computer system to store geographic information. The system known as TIGER would become the largest integrated, automated geographic database in the world when it was rolled out in time for use in the 1990 Decennial Census. Bob received numerous honors and awards for his contributions and achievements at work.

Son Brian recalls that Bob was "always so modest about the tributes that he received. He left his work at the office." Bob was a devoted family man. Jan says that he was actively involved in Eric's and Brian's scout and church group activities. Eric ultimately became an Eagle Scout. Skiing was a family sport. Both Eric and Brian became accomplished skiers. After the boys settled in the Richmond area with their respective families, Bob and Jan made frequent visits. They attended dance recitals, karate events, soccer games, birthdays, and other occasions that their grandchildren were involved in. "If you invited them, they would try to come," said Brian.

One acquisition which made it a lot easier for Bob and Jan to visit family and satisfy their wanderlust was a 15 passenger van. With ingenuity and Brian's help, Bob retrofitted the van to function as a camper. Four solar panels that were placed on the top of the van supplied two batteries which powered a small refrigerator, microwave, AC, electric blanket, and heater. A porta potty was installed as well. Off the grid, they were entirely self-sufficient.

Bob loved to work with his hands. "We liked to fix things rather than buy new," confided Jan. "We both had fathers who were the same way. That's why we have so many tools in our basement." While in college, Bob found a wooden canoe with a hole in it. He made the repairs which included a rib replacement, adding fiberglass, and a paint job. "We still have it," said Jan. "It's awfully heavy."

Their home displays the fruits of Bob's handiwork: skylights in the kitchen, built-in shelves in the study, and all sorts of landscaping. As needs arose in their sons' homes, Bob and Jan were there to provide assistance with painting, floor replacement, babysitting, and other tasks. At the family cabin on Cass Lake in northern MN where Bob and Jan retreated each summer, Bob assumed the maintenance work and repairs. One recent summer he built an entire shed to house their

equipment. Their leisure time there was spent exploring and hiking, swimming, canoeing, and sailing, and relaxing during the evening's happy hour.



Bob showed a connection with the outdoors from an early age. Jan recalls that backpacking in the Boundary Waters at the Canada-United States border had been a love of his. In college one summer he hiked the AT with a friend. The two walked from Mt. Washington in New Hampshire to the smoky mountains, hitch hiking past parts of the AT in order to finish by the time U of M started Fall classes.

Over the years Bob and Jan found ways to mix business with pleasure. When attending conferences in other countries, they charted their own add-ons. They traveled through areas of Australia, Puerto Rico, Hawaii, Indonesia, Africa, and Alaska. In 1987 they toured Europe as a family with Jan's father and his wife. Their love of skiing provided more opportunities for travel. "We have skied in the US, Canada, Argentina, Bulgaria, Slovenia, Austria, Switzerland, and France," recalled Jan. "Bob also skied in New Zealand.

Since joining PVS in 1967 both Bob and Jan have worn many hats. They have served as trip leaders, Excom members, meeting hosts, and event participants. Bob was President in '81-'83. More recently he was Chair of the Ski Trip Committee. He oversaw a major revision of the Ski Trip Guidelines which has been an invaluable aid to the Club as it conducts its task of planning trips. When Jan became editor of TOOT, Bob provided computer assistance, tweaking the layout and the presentation of photos. "A good proof reader too" said Jan.

In every capacity, Bob's forthright steady manner came through. "He very much enjoyed socializing," said Brian. "He saw the good in people. I think he got that from his mother. He was very much the caring, loving person she was."

I once attended a dinner dance function where Bob and Jan were among the guests. When a golden oldie started to spin, Bob and Jan took to the dance floor and fell into a jitterbug step from the late 50's. For a moment these two remarkable people looked just like everyone else. It was a temporary cover.

Our hearts go out to Jan, Eric, Brian and their many loved ones. We celebrate Bob's extraordinary life with you.

TRAVEL ALERT

Be aware that there are new travel requirements that you will have to comply with for the upcoming ski season. Under a new program, "Secure Flight", the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) requires the following:

- 1. When making flight reservations, you must provide your exact name as it appears on the ID you use to get on a flight, which means either a passport or driver's license. This will present no problem if your passport and driver's license are issued in the form you normally use when traveling.
- 2. You must also provide your date of birth and gender when buying tickets.

TSA has built in some flexibility for the near future but you should strive to obtain consistency between the name on your ID and travel documents.
