This has been an extremely strange arrival of spring, which seemed to start in mid-February with soaring temperatures. It was followed with the reoccurrence of winter by the arrival of a mid-March snowstorm so I could use my relatively new snow blower at least once for this winter season. This reverse arrival of spring seemed to totally confuse the Tidal Basin cherry trees, along with my King Alfred daffodils. I am still not sure if any of my personal Yoshino cherry trees will have their usual spring blooms.

As I sit in my study composing this column, I am reminded that spring is approaching since many plants in this room are responding to longer days of sunlight. I have 11 rooted cuttings of sun-loving coleus eager to be planted outside, 2 phalaenopsis moth orchids, and 7 epiphyllum cactus orchids. The picture below is that of an epiphyllum in full bloom



in mid-June.

Having grown orchids for many years when I had a greenhouse at my former home, I thought I would try the epiphylla since they are easier to overwinter when one does not have a greenhouse anymore.

Cuttings of these interesting cactus orchids were obtained online from a [California Nursery](#). The flowers range in an amazing array of colors: red, white, pink, peach, orchid, etc. I will probably have to wait another year for the 6-10" cuttings to bloom, but I think it will be worth the wait.

So what does this have to do with skiing? Nothing! However, it is a good way to pass the short winter days and joyfully anticipate life springing forth again.



Tour the National Archives with PVS led by Bing Van Nuys – Monday, May 22 at 9:45 am

Have you ever laid eyes on the documents that started it all? Among its other fascinating exhibits, the National Archives in downtown Washington DC, offers the chance to see “up close and personal” in the magnificent rotunda the original documents that are the foundation of our democracy – the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States and the Bill of Rights, collectively known as the Charters of Freedom.

Join PVS for a 90-minute guided tour of the treasures of the National Archives presented by our very own Bing Van Nuys, who is a docent at the National Archives. You’ll be thrilled to see these documents along with the Magna Carta and other fascinating treasures, as well as lots of background information that will make history come alive.

The building is easily accessible by Metro at the Archives/Navy Memorial/Penn Quarter Station on the Yellow or Green lines or by parking on the street or a nearby garage. **We enter at 9:45 am sharp at the Special Events entrance near the corner of 7th Street and Constitution Avenue.**

SKI TALK, April 2017

Well, happy April Fools' Day. The story I will tell you next is not a joke. We arrived in Val d'Iserre, France, during blizzard-like conditions. The bus trip up the mountain on the switch back road was hazardous at best. Cars were all over the road. What should have taken a half hour took more like an hour and a half. But, we made it safely and were happy in our hotel on the slopes in this beautiful area of the Alps. The next morning we got up to continued snowy weather and poor visibility. Some of us ventured out for a few runs. Dick and I opted to quit early because the conditions were dangerous. After going back to the hotel to change, we went to lunch. Walking back to the hotel after lunch, Dick slipped and fell on the ice in front of the hotel! His feet went out from under him. He knew instantly something was wrong. People helped him into the hotel and an ambulance was called. He was taken to the local clinic for an x-ray. They determined that he fractured the neck of his femur and he needed surgery. He was immediately put back in the ambulance and taken down the mountain to the Hospital at Bourg St. Maurice. Surgery was done early the next morning. Meanwhile, I was still in Val d'Iserre and could not get down the mountain until the next day. I packed our bags, checked out of our beautiful spa hotel and moved to a hotel near the hospital.

Help came from everywhere. The hotel personnel were terrific. Sara, who was in charge of groups at the hotel, went with me to the clinic to translate, and then she found a hotel for me near the hospital and helped me with calls and arrangements; Inge immediately contacted Sean at Holiday Tours, and he emailed a copy of our insurance policy; others took me under their wings and made sure I had dinner. I called the insurance company (**Travel Insured International**) that evening to report the injury and was shocked at their compassion and help. When I told them what the injury was, they connected me with a nurse and she told me the usual protocol for that was five days in the hospital and then they would send a nurse to accompany us home! The relief I felt was palpable. Could that be? Would we be taken care of in that way? Door to door service with a nurse; that was hard to comprehend.

The next day, I moved to Bourg St. Maurice five minutes from the hospital. I spent the week in this lovely town in the Alps visiting Dick in the hospital, communicating with the insurance company, exploring the town and sampling the local foods. I even took a funicular to Les Arcs ski area, which we could see from Dick's hospital window. Meanwhile, he received excellent care at the hospital. Later we found out that this hospital was one of the best in the area for orthopedic surgery. The hospital services a number of resorts in a huge ski area and helicopters were frequently landing on the roof with injured skiers. It was a very busy place.

Six days later a nurse arrived. She was British, but lived in the U. S. She visited Dick in the hospital to be sure he was fit to travel. The next morning at 6am she arrived with a car and driver and we were taken to Geneva Airport for a non-stop business class flight to Dulles. She took care of getting us through airports with no hassle. She sat beside Dick on the flight, monitored his condition to make sure he was okay and administered his required medication. A driver met us at Dulles and we were taken to our condo. The nurse came to the condo and did not leave until she was convinced Dick was comfortable!

Wow, the moral of the story is – **buy insurance**. I'm not sure how we would have handled this without the help of the insurance company. For years, we struggled with the question of insurance. Should we or shouldn't we? Yes it can be expensive, but at least make sure you are covered for medical and evacuation insurance whenever you leave home. Prognosis: Full Recovery.



PVS Pre-trip to Lyon, March 2-5, 2017


Before heading to the pistes of Val d'Isere, 19 members of PVS and other fellow ski clubs enjoyed a brief, but very engaging and enlightening, stop in Lyon, France. I had expected fabulous food and wine in this “gastronomique center of

France,” – and was not disappointed -- but the city’s important history and impressive architecture were a pleasant surprise. We stayed at the lovely Lyon Carlton Hotel, well located on a peninsula between the Rhone and Saone rivers that define the city, and close to the main squares, museums, historic buildings and fine restaurants.

Despite rainy weather, many took the funicular up the hill across the river to ancient Roman ruins and the Basilica of Notre Dame de Fourviere, with its gilded mosaics and multiple shrines to the Virgin

Mary. The site provided great views of the area and the “old town” below, with its secret passageways, early churches and many cafes and creperies.

For those interested in more recent history, a real find was the Center of History of the Resistance and Deportation, housed in a former military school that was taken over during World War II as Gestapo headquarters for the Vichy region, thus making it a site of imprisonment, torture and deportation of Jews and others. The city’s location and many hidden neighborhoods also suited it to be the organizational center for the French resistance. These activities and their consequences were chronicled in an informative audio guide and impressive visual displays.

Our time in Lyon was much too short, but this pre-trip has whetted my appetite for a longer return visit.



Imagine how thankful we were to see the hotel staff snatch our bags from the bus into waiting vans. They even gave some a lift the couple of blocks to the hotel. The hotel was excellent and conveniently located near the lifts and shops. For a few days it was even possible to ski directly back to the hotel at the end of the day, even though we did have to walk a bit to reach the slopes in the morning.

The first evening we enjoyed a welcome cocktail party attended by representatives from the Val d’Isère ski school and tourist office. This was followed by a delicious group meal in the hotel restaurant.

The next morning dawned socked in and snowy with several inches of fresh powder. There was much consternation at breakfast. Do we? Or don’t we? **Cara Jablon** opted for a lesson so that she would have someone to follow through the flat light. **Rosemary & Dick Schwartzbard**, accompanied by **Kay Christensen, Mary Ellena Ward &** co-trip-leader Jerry Poley and Kim Valaer of the Columbia Ski Club also braved the weather. After riding lifts up and riding lifts down, the group made it to the La Daille area where there were enough trees to prevent complete white-out conditions. There were also a lot of people who had the same idea and a lot of bumps carved in the fresh snow.

The hotel staff quickly got him inside and arranged for an ambulance. He had surgery in Bourg-Saint-Maurice the next day to pin the fracture. (The hospital there is said to be one of the top ten in France for breaks of this type.) Rosemary was able to relocate down the mountain to stay with him. We missed them both and were glad to hear that the surgery was successful.

The following day was, if possible, even more challenging with continuing snow and poor visibility. A few intrepid skiers ventured out. Non-skiers **Mike & Eloise Strand** and **Jim Slack** discovered slip-on crampons at the ski shop to prevent further injuries like Dick's. They worked well! That evening many of us attended a "Classicaval" Music Festival at the nearby Baroque church. It was a spectacular event featuring a string quartet, flute, piano, and soprano performing works ranging from Mozart to Puccini. Afterwards, there was a reception where we could greet the artists. Several of our group had not been able to obtain tickets for the sold-out performance, but they were able to attend later in the week.





Jack A. Chapman (Age 78)

Jack Albert Chapman of Arlington, VA died on March 9, 2017. He had Alzheimer's disease. Jack was born on December 1, 1938 in Amarillo, TX, but grew up from age three in Joplin, MO. He attended the Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago on a Naval ROTC scholarship and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in physics in 1960. A 20-year career in the Marine Corps followed. The part of Jack's career that had the most lasting impact on him was his assignment to organize and manage a Vietnamese refugee camp at Camp Pendleton, CA, during the first wave of refugees that arrived in the United States after the fall of Saigon on April 30, 1975. A musical refugee family wrote, and recorded on a cassette tape, "Major Chapman Song." The sheet music hung in Jack's study for the rest of his life. Jack was also a competition shooter for the Marine Corps and competed and placed in the Nationals in 1963. After retiring from the Marine Corps, Jack had a second 20-year career, this one as a computer systems engineer with Lockheed Martin. Along the way, Jack earned two masters degrees in the computer field, one from The Naval Post Graduate School in Monterey, CA and the other from Marymount University in Arlington, VA. Jack loved distance running, skiing, mountain climbing, fishing, geology, paleontology, and chess, and eagerly traveled the world over with his wife. He shared these loves with his extended family and left memories of a life well lived.



Jack is survived by his wife of 32 years, Eleanor M. Thayer; three children and two step-children, Christine Chapman Rossomondo (Tom), John Chapman, Monica Chapman Carter (Mark Owens), Michael Roll (Maura), and Tricia Duncan (Gary); three sisters, Carolin Wilson (Tom), Sarah Prince (Steve), and MaryAnn Chapman; 12 grandchildren, Justin Otley, Jordyn Otley, Austin Fairbanks, Kelli Fairbanks, Laura Fairbanks, Rachel Chapman, Tristan Chapman, Perry Roll, Elena Roll, Rebecca Roll, Christopher Duncan, and Spencer Duncan; and numerous nieces and nephews.

A memorial gathering was held at Murphy's Funeral Home at 4510 Wilson Boulevard, Arlington, VA, from 6:00pm to 9:00pm on Thursday, March 16.
