

PRESIDENT'S REPORT - STYLE AND GRACE

At this moment, people are lying inertly on Hawaiian beaches. They think that they are happy. At most they may be surfacely content.

Slothful beach huggers lack Style and Grace. They lack the ability to soar. Even though a limited number of beach huggers may lift themselves up from the hot sand to go into the waves, even to go surfing, inevitably they are plunged into the sea. Their falls cannot be graceful. Achievement does not come from beach inactivity even when that inactivity is accompanied by slight movements to lift pineapples filled with rum or to lift bodies from swirling water.

By contrast, as the Olympics demonstrate, expert skiers are the epitome of Style and Grace. They race down mogul fields interspersed with areal somersault inducing terrain. Olympic skiing is infused with style, allowing the racers to ski past each mogul with precision while reaching for the gold. Ski jumping is pure grace. Skiing past slalom poles with form demands an additional mastery of style. In downhill racing in which skiers go straight down steep, iced mountain fall lines making only the slightest turns off dead center, skiing becomes art.

More ordinary skiers also try to learn expert turns. They augment their skiing style with outfits from Fifth Avenue's above \$1,000 racks or, better still, from Rosemary Schwartzbard's Second Hand emporia.

As ski instructors and Olympic announcers educate, successful skiing entails graceful movement. It eliminates excessive motion, reducing unnecessary skier effort. In the Olympics where milliseconds matter, skiers must master perfect form. So it is with PVSers, who, as they ski downhill, demonstrate vast skill.

Skiing becomes Style and Grace.

This is in line with much other achievement. Picture Willie Mays racing across Center Field to catch distant fly balls, bread basket style. Winning ice skating teams exhibit synchronized style. John Updike penned perfectly phrased stories conveying life's ironies and infidelities. Cole Porter's music never had out of place notes; accompanying lyrics never had misplaced phrases. Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers moved across stages with perfect grace. Civil War Generals learned the proper form of warfare from past master battles, correctly aligning their armies' centers and flanks. *Continued on Page 2*

From the North

Exit the Beltway (495) at George Washington Parkway, continue past Reagan National Airport into Alexandria, where GW Parkway becomes Washington Street. Turn left at Princess Street (9th traffic light – Wells Fargo Bank on the right). #604 is on the right in the first block.

From the South

Take the Beltway (495) exit North for Alexandria Old Town and Route 1. Follow signs for Route 1 North (Patrick Street) to Princess Street (the 3rd light after King Street). Turn right onto Princess Street and #604 is 3 ½ blocks on the right.

Parking – on the street. It's ok to park on Princess Street for 2 hours (limit not strictly enforced) but the best bet is to park on Washington Street or on St. Asaph Street. If in doubt, be sure to read the parking signs!



President's Message continued:

The importance of style is best illustrated by debating, which has morphed into legal oral arguments. In debating, one can make three points within the ten minutes allotted, but these points must be clear. Better yet, one can make two points with total clarity or if one is sufficiently skilled, a single point so finely expressed that it cannot be misunderstood. The best debaters manage to make no points with perfect, absolute clarity.

Style and Grace do not allow for disorder. Style becomes substance. There is no room for a cloud on the horizon or for other of life's difficulties. One of our members, whom I shall call Kerry,* has warned: "Style and Grace are not everything." His example: it is better to jerk, ruining one's form, than to make a well-carved turn into a tree, over a cliff, or, for snowboarders, into standing skiers. This applies even when snowboarders follow an elegant path.

No one ever called Babe Ruth graceful. But in between hot dogs, he hit towering home runs. Gene Kelly's athleticism beat Astaire and Rogers. Tolstoy had more to say than Updike, but perhaps he said it less gracefully. Cole Porter did not teach life's cruelties like Brecht. Lincoln's pre-Grant Generals did everything but win. Grant's victories came at a terrible cost, but they saved the union and (substantially) ended slavery.

Style, grace and success are not the same thing. Style and grace may lead to success. They may not.

My wife passed onto my daughter that our grandson, who will be four next winter, will be old enough to ski. By beginning early, he can learn to ski with Style and Grace. Cara's observation appears to have been morphed into an invitation for the family to go together on a ski trip.

The return message was, "Maybe we can go to Hawaii...."

February 14-21, 2018

Big Sky is BIG! It is currently the biggest ski area in the U. S. with 5800 skiable acres. We all arrived on time on Valentine's Day at the Huntley Lodge and were

greeted with a Welcome Party attended by representatives from the mountain. The next several days the temperatures were moderate and it snowed most of the time, providing the wonderful "Montana Cold Smoke" as the locals call the dry fresh powder.

Typical of group ski trips we had a couple different "ski groups" that changed composition each day, if not several times during the day. With temperatures in the upper teens on Thursday (our first morning) and 3-4 inches of powder almost all of the PVS trip participants went on guided tours of the mountain. Off one of the trails our guide pointed out the exclusive Yellowstone Club where Bill Gates, Warren Buffet, Justin Timberlake, and Tom Brady have homes. Friday brought a bit of wind, but temperatures made it into the mid-20s. Saturday morning we made several blissful runs through 7-8 inches of powder. For some the highlight may have been the heated seats and bubble cover of the powder seeker chair rather than the knee-deep powder on the ski slope.





Sunday's skiing was another morning of powder. Heavy snowfall and wind continued until late morning before the peak of Lone Mountain finally popped into view for the first time since our arrival. The deep powder combined with bright sunlight made skiing challenging but magical. Skiing on Monday and Tuesday involved periodic stops to warm up since the temperatures dropped dramatically and the morning temperature was minus 14. The search for trails and lifts that were in the sun and out of the wind, periodic checks for possible frostbite, and constant hopes that the temperature would break through 0 degrees were the concerns of the day. Overall it was a week of great, sometimes challenging, skiing and some

rather extreme weather conditions.



A highlight of the week for some was the trip to Yellowstone National Park. Nine PVSers boarded their snow coach for a bumpy, yet exhilarating day trip to see Old Faithful. They experienced blinding snow, sunshine, freezing temperatures (and heated toilets!). They saw hot springs, mud pots, gurgling



pools, geysers, a "stuck" snow coach (to which they lent a shovel), and snowboarders who ended up in a snow bank. They were lucky to spot two elks, one coyote, two crows and all the magnificent bison eating the dried

grasses underneath the snow along the riverbanks. A gathering of bison on the main road gave ample opportunity for taking videos and photos.

The group was also part of a historical event. It was the first time in many years that Old Faithful did not erupt at the predicted time, being over one hour late. It was worth the wait to be at this unique experience.

Susan Payne had her own adventures. One day she went on a six-mile snowshoe tour on the mountain in the snowy, cold weather. The next day she signed up for a zip-line experience on the mountain. She was

strapped onto the zip and had to jump off fearlessly hoping the straps would hold her!! One jump was not thrilling enough so she did four zips to get the adrenaline going.



Of course, what is a PVS trip without social events that include food and wine? In addition to the welcome party we had a Pizza Party at the hotel the second night. Another night all 28 of us managed to mingle in close proximity in Manfred Boehringer's room where Marianne and Inge plus many in the group supplied lots of wine and goodies. Doug Horstmann, who was the vendor of this trip (and many other PVS trips), stopped by and was able to meet many of the people he only knew by phone or email. The Farewell Dinner

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SKI TALK March 2018

Having just come back from a two-week trip to California and then to Montana to ski I am acutely aware of how important it is to pack light and be aware of your fellow travelers. Packing for a ski trip is no easy task. Add a week to California where a few days would be beachside and then on to San Francisco makes it a little more



complicated. We allowed ourselves one duffel bag each, which contained all our clothing for the two weeks and our ski boots. Skis were shipped via FedEx. The important part is only taking what you need and using clothing multiple times. The secret is layering and avoiding bringing bulky items. I was able to wear the same clothing in the evenings in California as I did at après ski events, a lightweight top covered by a sweater. Accessorizing with different scarves and jewelry works well, also. Dick travels with a few shirts and sweaters! We have gone on Rick Steves tours where you are only "allowed" to bring a carry-on size suitcase. Check out Packing Smart and Traveling Light on the Rick Steves website.



The other issue is travel etiquette on planes, buses and trains. If taking a carry-on, be sure it is no larger than 22 inches and that it will fit in the overhead. Try to put it in the overhead above your seat. Try to do this quickly so that other passengers may pass by. If you travel with a backpack take it off when you get onto the plane and carry it in front of you to avoid whacking other passengers. What about the people who hover around the baggage carousel so you can't get to you suitcase? I saw a child too close to the carousel almost get hit by a heavy suitcase. Be aware of how you impact others when you travel.

Yes, bags do get lost. The statistics show that 2.7 bags per 1000 passengers get lost. What to do? Be sure you have identification on the outside and inside of your baggage. Some of the more high tech tags can follow your effects. For example, the Pixie (\$29, getpixie.com) a Bluetooth enabled fob, attaches to your checked bags and track it through an app called Baggage Claim. When you get to the carousel, fire up the app and it will display a metal detector-style screen that gives the exact distance of your bag. Low-tech luggage tags are still used by most people. Our ski trip vendors usually give us neon tags with the hotel name and address on it. They are usually quite flimsy so attach another more sturdy tag also. If you have a non-descript black bag think of creative ways to make it stand out. I put red duct tape on mine. Some people spray paint their bags. Some just tie colorful ribbons on it.

We are now looking forward to next ski season. So far ExCom has approved a trip to Snowmass next January and the BRSC Western Carnival at Sun Valley next February. More information will be in the April and May TOOTs. If you have other ideas for a ski trip next year or in the future, please let me know. We are always looking for trip leaders.
