President's Message

WHAT CAN I WRITE? WHAT CAN I SAY?

I write this column sitting at my office computer. It is that time again. But what can I write?

No. I am serious. What can I write?¹

I might write about – Religion? Politics? Sex? But can I? Writings on such subjects may offend. Social mores exist for sensitive subjects.

I might write gossip, but I do not know gossip of interest.²

I could write about skiing, but spring has come. So what can I write?

The question that I raise is the appropriateness of subject matter for *TOOT* columns. By extension, I raise the questions of limits for discussions within PVS.

When I went off to college in 1957, my mother told me, "Don't sign anything." Dredging up people's discrediting actions and words, Joseph McCarthy and his ilk had been recently purging America of people deemed bad. At the time, a grave threat was that something might get on one's "permanent record."

We loosened up during the mid and late 1960s. People signed – and said – almost anything, regardless of records, official or otherwise. We marched if we chose. However, the side that we were on deeply divided us then. It does still.

PVS members state with pride that we hold meetings at members' homes. We connote friendship and sociality. Friendship requires meaningful connections among people. Friends discuss that which matters to them.

A PVS strength is that our members have different backgrounds and beliefs, skiing being one of our commonalities, the strength of our PVS community being another. Generally, religious and irrelevant status barriers

have broken down, thankfully, so that differences that would have mattered when I went to college are hardly noticed today. To their credit and perhaps ours, our children do not see the kind of non-relevant status differences that once had the power to divide. However, we cannot say that no status barriers exist today. The potency of political barriers appears to be increasing.

I read an unsettling book recently, *American Nations* by Colin Woodard ("*American Nations: A History of the Eleven Rival Regional Cultures of North America*"), which I recommend. The author's thesis is that the United States consists of separate co-existing nations, each with different cultures and values. Boston, New York, Philadelphia, the Piedmont South, the Deep South, the West Coast and so forth have their own ethos. The author contends that America's regional values were shaped by each area's first settlers well before the American Revolution and that the differences at the time of our formation continue to this day. He contends that when people move among regions, they adopt the prevailing local mores rather than harmonizing cultural values to form proverbial "melting pots."

Although overarching his thesis has exaggeration, to the extent that Colin Woodard has a valid point, it will be difficult for the American Nation (singular) to maintain itself as a cohesive whole. The sometimes highly charged political and other differences among us caution for some care in our communications. But if we protect members' mental as well as their physical space, with a bit of cautionary correctness, PVS members can communicate broadly aiding our ability to know and benefit from each other. If this is the case, I can write TOOT columns about anything – even skiing – if I do so politely. Readers beware.

SKI TALK

APRIL 2018

Ski season has ended for most of us and it is this time of year that I reflect on my



recent ski trips. In January we went to Snowmass and the snow conditions were rather thin. In my twenty years of going to Snowmass in January, I have never encountered similar conditions. Then we went to Big Sky and encountered just the opposite. We had deep snow and frigid conditions.



While neither trip had ideal weather, they were both very enjoyable and got rave reviews.

It is not the snow conditions or the temperature that makes a good trip, it is the people who go on the trips. PVSers are a hardy group. No matter what the conditions, they go out and ski. Whether it is skiing around rocks and shrubs or skiing through deep powder in sub-zero conditions, we were out there skiing.



When people ask what makes PVS special, I immediately reply, "the members". This is easily seen on the ski trips. Whether you are a long-term member, or this is your first trip, you will be included. On every trip there is a welcome party where people are usually introduced, and information is disseminated about skiing, dinners, après ski events, etc. At each subsequent event, more information is given and people are encouraged to participate.

Our ski trip leaders are volunteers. They are sometimes compensated for their rooms if

enough people participate. They take care of the money; they work with the vendor and the hotels; they organize the après ski activities and dinners; they take care of anyone who gets injured or needs help. They are always available which often cuts into their skiing. It is always heartening to see other members volunteer to help the trip leaders with the various activities. Also, we encourage trip members to come up with



additional activities such as dinners, museum visits, etc. that they organize and lead.

Growing up in the heat and humidity of pancake flat Houston, snow and skiing were completely alien to me as a youngster. I first strapped on skis at the age of 28 in Les Arc, France - learning under the socalled ski-evolutif (short ski) method, which was all the rage at the time. (Do they still teach beginners with that method anywhere?) It's an understatement to say I was a slow learner, but I did eventually graduate to full length skis.

Until 2014, when I tore my ACL in a ridiculously inane accident at Ski Santa Fe, I skied annually, with Alta and Steamboat Springs being my two most frequent destinations. Since the accident, my skiing has been limited, not so much due to the ACL tear, but due to a plague of other injuries brought on by my other sporting endeavor of marathon running. In fact, I met Rosemary Schwartzbard, my PVS sponsor, at the swimming pool while recuperating from a marathon-induced stress fracture.

I have been living vicariously through Rosemary's PVS trips for the past few years and look forward to getting back on skis and enjoying a PVS trip firsthand in 2019.

Injured Reserve – Kay Christensen, Denver, CO

Thank you, Inge, & all of the PVS members!

You were so sweet to send me a beautiful bouquet of pink, red & yellow tulips that are delightful to look at!

I guess Rosemary told you about my really stupid skiing accident. (The emergency room guys said they all were stupid!).

We were skiing at Beaver Creek and because the snow wasn't very good, just taking it easy down blue groomers. We were well off the lift when I skied over to my friend to ask about upcoming plans. Somehow our skis became entangled and she kept going straight while I got pivoted around so that I was literally skiing backwards. My legs were in a V and I couldn't stop them from spreading further & further apart. The pressure on my right knee was horrific & it finally popped. Then I fell to the ground. I thought my leg was broken, but instead I tore two ligaments, the ACL & the MCL. Because the ligaments are not displaced, the doctor thinks they could reattach to the bone after blood and new cells grow in the injured area. So I need to keep my knee straight and am in a straight-leg brace from thigh to ankle for 6 weeks. I need to keep it on 24/7 but can remove it to shower, keeping my leg straight. I also can release the brace 30 degrees which allows me to drive

It is literally a pain in the butt! My derriere gets sore from sitting so much. Obviously, my activities are very limited at this point, but I can go play bridge. This inconvenience will be worth it if I can avoid surgery.

I certainly didn't intend to be added to the PVS injured skier-roster! We had quite a few injuries on our ladies' ski bus this season, with two ladies colliding last week. One was okay; the other had to have hip replacement surgery.

Thank you so much for thinking of me. Please give my thanks & good wishes to all PVS members.
