#### President's Message

#### Nature's Awesomeness

We ski in Nature. We travel down, often majestic, beautiful, snow-covered mountains. These mountains have been formed by combinations of intense plate tectonic activity; volcanoes; advancing and receding glaciers; the forces of air and water; and Nature's other awesome forces.

Nature creates conditions that allow us to experience beauty when we are skiing. We find fresh, unskied snow. We pass snow covered fir trees, sometimes with glistening icicles. We ascend mountains allowing us to look outwards, seeing other peaks and valleys below. We see animal footprints. Every once in a while, we see scampering animals themselves. We see Nature.

We need snow to capture this shining beauty. Skiing is dependent upon Nature's child, Weather. Like many children, Weather is prone to go off on her own.

The January 11, 2018, *New York Times* reported that by 2050 many prior Winter Olympic locations may be too warm to again host the Olympics. Many sites in this country can no longer be assured of sufficient snow. At Sochi, Russia had to import snow. Cara led a Bend, Oregon PVS ski trip, which had a week of rain, an event that local residents credibly claimed had not happened before. Far more alarming, a lead August 10, 2018, New York Times headline called this "The Year Global Warming Made its Menace a Reality." The *Times* (through Somini Senguputa) said:



This summer of fire and swelter looks a lot like the future that scientists have been warning about in the era of climate change...The disruptions to everyday life have been devastating and far-reaching. In California, firefighters are racing to control...the largest fire in state history....In Europe, nuclear power plants have had to shut down because the river water that cools the reactors was too warm. Heat waves on four continents have brought electricity grids crashing.

Extreme weather has been worldwide. Lakes necessary for fish supply are receding. Glacier meltdowns are occurring. *Continued on page 2.*

Ocean levels are rising. Because of smoke, Yosemite National Park has been closed indefinitely. Florida coastal cities and even New York City subways are flooding.

I was taken by an article by Bianca Bosker, "What Really Killed the Dinosaurs," which is in this September issue of the Atlantic Monthly. The article reports on physicist Gerta Keller's conclusion that the cause of the fifth mass extinction that doomed the dinosaurs was "a series of colossal volcanic eruptions," not, as most scientists believe, a massive six-mile wide asteroid crashing into Mexico, which "unleashed giant fireballs, crushing tsunamis, continent-shaking earthquakes, and suffocating darkness..." (Of course, volcanoes and a giant meteorite could both have contributed.)

Ms. Keller is reported to fear "that we are filling our environment with the same ingredients – sulfur, carbon dioxide, mercury, and more – that killed the dinosaurs and that, left unchecked, will catalyze another mass extinction, this one of our own devising." In parallel, the *New Yorker's Elizabeth Kolbert's The Sixth Extinction: An Unnatural History* (2014) won the Pulitzer Prize for her book that argues that we are in the <u>midst of a modern, man-made extinction</u>.

So as winter approaches, let us enjoy skiing to the fullest. As we ski, let us see the awesomeness of Nature, the mountains' majesty, the snow's beauty and the manifold visages. Let us also think about Nature's fierceness and the protective measures that we can take.

May Nature's forces be benign during our trips to Snowmass, Sun Valley, Steamboat and elsewhere where we travel. And may the force be with us.



# **Trip Details**

Once again we will be staying at the Snowmass Mountain Chalet (SMC), which offers a convenient ski in, ski out location. Check the web site at <a href="www.mountainchalet.com">www.mountainchalet.com</a>. The "Land Only" package includes: transportation to and from Aspen airport (7am -11pm); 5-day senior lift pass (good for all four ski areas in the Aspen complex, free shuttle bus) with option for extra days; 7 nights lodging (double occupancy); daily breakfasts; daily soup lunch; luggage handling; a welcome reception, an "all guest" hotel sponsored party, a pizza party and a farewell group dinner to celebrate our trip. Additional nights at Snowmass are an option based on availability. Trip insurance is available through Encompasse Tours and is <a href="highly recommended">highly recommended</a>. For trail information check <a href="www.aspensnowmass.com">www.aspensnowmass.com</a>.

The basic package at \$1,650 includes a 5-day lift pass for skiers 65 and over. Skiers under 65 will have to add \$104.00.

#### **The Mountain Chalet**

The **Snowmass Mountain Chalet** is an independent lodge, managed on-site, with easy access to the slopes. Each of the 64 rooms has either 2 queen beds or 1 king bed, **depending on availability**. All rooms have: hair dryer, TV, small refrigerator, etc. The lodge has a nice lounge on the main floor with chairs, game tables, fireplace, and large windows overlooking the slopes. There is an elevator, exercise room, outdoor pool, a hot tub and laundry facilities. A full breakfast is served family style each morning. A complimentary soup lunch is served from Noon to 1:30 PM. The lodge has no restaurant for dinner. However, the Snowmass Mall, on the level above, and hotel area below (via the small gondolas) has diverse restaurants at all price levels. Bus service stops are nearby for trips to a nearby grocery store, into the town of Aspen, to other Aspen ski areas, and to Glenwood Springs.

## **Trip Insurance**

**Trip insurance is recommended**. Travel Guard is available through our travel agent, Encompasse Tours, at **Encompasse.com**. (The insurance link will connect you to Travel Guard.) The insurance provides coverage for accident, illness, injury, or death to attendee or immediate family member. There are several plans available, depending on your situation. You will have more reimbursement options by purchasing shortly after sending in your trip deposit. Please read carefully before choosing. And, be sure to save all receipts concerning your trip!

#### **Cancellation Policy and Fees**

If it becomes necessary for you to cancel your trip, the trip leaders will try to minimize your losses, although some fees are mandated by the hotel and tour operator. All cancellations must be in writing. We strongly urge you to purchase trip insurance (see above).

Please take the time to ensure the information you provide is correct, and take note of deadline dates!

<u>Cancellation fees are as follows:</u> <u>Dates and costs are consistent with requirements and penalties imposed by vendors per contracted agreements.</u> <u>LAND Only Package</u>: \$300 after September 28th until December 1st; after December 1st, cost is entirely non-refundable.

<u>If you are a "single" participant</u> requesting space on a PVS-endorsed ski trip and need a roommate, we recommend each of you purchase insurance to cover both of you if one of the roommates cancels. Otherwise, you will be offered the choice of one of the following three options:

- 1) Helping the trip leader find a replacement trip participant who will fill the space vacated; or
- 2) Staying on the ski trip by paying the "single supplement" or
- 3) Canceling from the ski trip and paying all currently due penalties.

We are conducting a Steamboat Springs ski trip that we hope will excite PVS Skiers. PVS frequented Steamboat Springs for many years. We now return. Steamboat Springs has varied terrain for all skiing levels; a large, well-kept mountain; long runs; 18 lifts, 165 trails, 2,965 acres; a historic town; unique restaurants; art, Western stores, antiques, museums; free ski area/town bus service. # Steamboat Springs PVS March 9-16, 2019 SKI TRIP Addendum

PVS' Steamboat Springs ski trip will be between March 9 - 16, 2019. The trip's timing should allow for both good weather and good skiing conditions. As we state in the Steamboat Springs ski trip flier, with the help of Doug Horstman of Encompasse Tours, trip participants will have lodging in the Steamboat Grand, a superior hotel within walking distance of the ski slopes and plaza; non-stop air fare at a group rate; Hayden airport shuttle service; discounted ski tickets; and, most important, PVS member participation. Currently, nine people are committed.

The Grand Hotel has a near monopoly of what it calls "beautifully appointed" hotel rooms proximate to gondola square and the ski lifts. We have guaranteed two additional rooms to the five that are now committed. If the Grand has any vacant additional rooms available, it is **obligated** to make them available to PVS so that we can further increase our room reservations, but this additional vacant room availability is not guaranteed.

We have 26 reserved air reservations. We can cancel space through November 30, 2019. We need ten reservations by people who will fly on the group fare to guaranty the group rate (including those with upgrades, but not including those who pay with frequent flyer tickets). If we are short, participants may have to book air transportation on their own or may have to pay a higher price. Airport shuttle service to and from the Grand will be provided in any event.

We need 20 participants to hold the group lift ticket pricing, but we need not specify final arrangements until February 1, 2019. Obtaining individual lift tickets, if necessary, should not be a problem.

Initial payments for new participants are \$600, which covers Grand Hotel deposits and is credited against Grand room rates. Additional payments will not be due until November 20, 2018.

We shall work to make the trip successful. The Steamboat Springs ski mountain has interesting, varied terrain, is well serviced and is in a unique Western town. Additional attendees are invited.

# **BEAUTIFUL SUNNY NORWAY** – Ellie Thayer

(May 31 - June 14, 2018)

Sheila (my sister-in-law) and I embarked on a trip to Norway led by Roz, a retired art and architecture professor, and 17 fellow travelers expecting the usual June rain and cool temperatures. Our expectations exploded like the northern lights before our very eyes and warm bodies. Not one drop of rain fell on us and the temperatures reached highs in the 80s every day for 10 days. The only downside to warm, blue-sky, cloudless, low-humidity days was the lack of air conditioning in all our hotels. After visiting Bergen, Balestrand, a fjord or two, and Oslo, Sheila and I left the group at the end of their 10-day tour and flew to Trondheim to visit Joe and Anna, my nephew and his wife. Trondheim was cloudy with highs in the 50s, but still no rain on us (there were some near misses as some rain fell during the night).

I'll try not to overuse the word "charming" in this report, but it will be difficult. Our first stop was Bergen, Norway's second largest city. Charming. Bergen is a World Heritage City with a compact old town centered around the wharf. Bryggen is the Hanseatic District of Old Town filled with wooden houses and warehouses. In the Hanseatic Museum, we encountered the pungent smell of dried cod. Really pungent. Cod and dried cod were staple products for centuries.

We visited an open-air museum of 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> century life with costumed guides explaining a bit about life in the old times. Later, we witnessed a modified flash mob doing some dance steps in a Bergen street. Fun.

Ole Bull – I must admit that I had not heard of him before the trip. He was a world-famous violinist in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. We ferried to his beautiful summer home on the island of Lysøen. In our free hour after the tour, Sheila and I decided to follow a short hiking path on the island. Well, to make a long story short, we got hopelessly lost and ended up running to catch the ferry, which was ready to leave. Even scarier than being lost with no cell coverage, was the discovery that our guide had miscounted the group sitting on the ferry and thought the entire group was onboard. We gratefully toured Edvard Grieg's summer home at Troldhaugen following this near disaster. Our last stop was to a stave church at Fantoft. Unfortunately, it had been reconstructed after a fire in 1992. Soulless.


I am quite fond of art museums, but the Bergen CODA did not offer much to me. Wonderful art would have to wait until Oslo.

Unlike most of Roz's trips, this one had days without human art and architecture and instead featured Mother Nature's unparalleled beauty of the fjords.



We took a four-hour ferry ride from Bergen to tiny Balestrand staying in the historic 1877 Kviknes Hotel, which hosted a historic buffet each evening. There were Norwegian salmon five ways and everything else one could want. This was not the Golden Corral. We could see the Sognefjord, Norway's largest fjord, from our hotel window. The tiny town also boasted St. Olaf's Church completed in 1897 in the neo-stave style. The coronation church in *Frozen* was patterned on this church. My  $3\frac{1}{2}$  -year old granddaughter was impressed. On the second day, we took a ferry on the Fjaerlandsfjord to see a glacier and attendant museum. Scarily, the glacier has shrunk dramatically in the last ten years.

The next day proved long and picturesque. We took a ferry to Flåm, a Unesco World Heritage Site, where we caught the Flåmsbana (train) for a 12-mile journey through 20 tunnels and unbelievable scenery, and finally climbed aboard a modern train to continue to Oslo, a five-hour journey.

Oslo, the smallest of the Scandinavian capitals, proved charming. The Nobel Peace Prize is awarded in Oslo's City Hall (the other Nobel prizes are awarded in Stockholm). The Opera House, completed in 2007, is made of Italian marble and invites all to walk up the long ramp and stroll around the roof. The famous outdoor Vigelandsparken was designed by Gustav Vigeland. A fellow traveler commented that she had never been to a city with so many statues of nude figures. The statues show babies, toddlers, teens, and adults of all ages.

The surprise of the trip – I loved the anguished art of Edvard Munch (of *Scream* fame). We visited the Munch Museum as well as the National Art Museum. Both museums had rooms of Munch's works. The much parodied *Scream* was among my least favorite of his paintings. # ROOSEVELT ISLAND HIKE - July 27, 2018



On July 27<sup>th</sup>, nine hardy souls (eight PVSers and one guest) took a leisurely, but hot, hike around Roosevelt Island. The park is located in the Potomac River (technically VA) but can only be accessed off the GW Parkway North. After meeting in the parking lot, we all walked across the bridge to the 88.5-acre national memorial park. It had finally dried up enough with bright sunshine so we could enjoy the outdoors. As we meandered the Swamp Trail (longest on the island), we observed various birds, turtles, fauna and greenery of the forested island. The trails are also frequented by runners and walkers of all ages, all of whom were out that day.

According to Rosemary, the island has a long

history. There was an American Indian presence in early times. In 1717, George Mason purchased the island, and the Mason family had an estate on the island for over 40 years. In 1748 a ferry service to Georgetown began, and in 1807 a causeway was built to Rosslyn. In 1931, the island was bought for a memorial to Theodore Roosevelt. The Memorial was dedicated in 1967. It is one of the largest memorials in the area with a 17-foot statue of Theodore Roosevelt and four large stone monoliths



of Roosevelt's famous quotations and two large fountains. There were some very thoughtful quotations from "Teddy" on why natural areas of exceptional beauty must be preserved in the national interest.

All in all it was a wonderful morning hike and, for most of us, a new and interesting adventure. After the hike, most of the group went to lunch at the Holiday Inn in Rosslyn. The restaurant is on the top floor overlooking Roosevelt Island, Georgetown, and the Potomac. We ended the event with good food and beautiful views. Thank you, Rosemary, for organizing the hike.
