

As befits a ski column, a couple of issues ago, I asked "Why Ski?" I suggested that we ski to experience gliding down mountains. I referred to our pushing against limits. However, over time, these experiences may become more difficult to achieve. The positive experiences of skiing do not go away, but they may come with greater difficulty or less of the time. Along with practice, lessons, and desire, *shared club support can help members maintain skiing comfort levels and benefits*.

As I wrote in past columns, PVS members have skiing connections in common. Apart from skiing, we have the advantage of an otherwise diverse membership. Our ability to explore members' fundamental differences – work, background, religion, politics – can bring us together, if we can explore differences with requisite respect and without excessive proselytizing. Our coming together through skiing from our diversity may provide paths to optimize both PVS skiing and our relationships.

Finally, in transferring the gavel, I again note for Tom, ExCom and PVS the importance of rejuvenation for continued club vibrancy. Our challenge is to garner new and younger members.

This is all I have.

That is a first that all 6 grands have been together. Such a nice time was had by all.





Behind the Scenes at NASA/Goddard Space Flight Center Tuesday, June 11, 2019 from 1-3 pm

Did you know that many NASA satellites are being built and tested at Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, MD? PVS member **Dorian Janney** is the Outreach Coordinator for the Global Precipitation Measurement (GPM) mission. She will lead a *"behind the scenes"* tour for PVS focusing on the GPM mission.

We will have a presentation on this mission from a GPM scientist, hear from the GPM Applications Coordinator about how the data are being used to improve life in a variety of ways, visit the satellite Ground Control Room, and learn from the GPM Communications Engineer about how the data from GPM and the supporting satellites in the constellation are collected and stored at GSFC.



We will meet at the GSFC Visitor's Center in Greenbelt, MD <u>at **12:45 PM on June 11**th</u>. There is plenty of parking there, as well as a nice free museum to explore and a gift shop to visit, if you so desire. Feel free to arrive early if you want time to visit the gift shop and museum. If we have 15 or more people, NASA/GSFC will provide a van to take us on our tour. If not, we will caravan in as few cars as possible to assist in being able to park close to the buildings we will visit. There will be some walking, but there are elevators in all buildings that we will visit.

This is a rare opportunity to be able to come on the GSFC campus and visit these facilities, and even rarer to have scientists and engineers give us their time and energy! So, come on out and find out how and why NASA is measuring global precipitation and be awed by the incredible science and technology being developed right here in the greater Washington metropolitan area.

As we will be going on the secure campus, there will be a **<u>cut-off date of April 16th</u>** (the date of the PVS Annual Meeting)

to sign up for this tour. We will need to send in your credentials (name, driver's license number, etc.) six weeks before the tour to get your on-campus badging. <u>This tour will be open only to U.S.</u> <u>citizens due to security restrictions</u>.



SKI TALK APRIL 2019

What an epic snow season! I have never skied in as much powder as I skied in this year. It was often difficult to find groomed slopes since the snow was coming down so consistently. We had great powder in Snowmass, and Steamboat was even better. It snowed six out of the seven days we were there.
That did mean poor visibility often, but it was like skiing on clouds. Aspen/Snowmass had about 350" of snowfall this season; Steamboat had about 295"; and Sun Valley had about 179". The most snowfall this year was in the West Coast resorts and Alta/Snowbird also came out high. There is no

question, this was an excellent year for snow in our West. Hopefully, we will have good snow next year so we can continue to work on our powder skiing skills.

Speaking of weather, we experienced an interesting weather phenomenon at Steamboat called inversion. Apparently it happens quite frequently in Steamboat. Inversions are common in river valleys, such as Steamboat's Yampa Valley. Cold air sinks to the bottom of the mountain and gets stuck there by the river basin. Fresh snowfall followed by a clear, dry evening contributes to inversions. On a sunny clear day, the snow reflects the sun's heat instead of absorbing it. So, in Steamboat, it is often colder in the valley than on the mountain. On our last day we woke up to single digit temperatures, and we dressed accordingly. However, when we got to the top of the mountain, it was warmer by about 15 degrees.





PVS will be joining the Blue Ridge Ski Council (BRSC) at Snowmass next year. BRSC is an organization of member ski clubs in the DC area, Richmond and Baltimore. The trip will be at the end of January instead of the middle of the month, when we usually go to Snowmass. Our club will again stay at Mountain Chalet and we will join with other BRSC clubs for après ski activities. Our club often participates in the annual BRSC trips to Europe or the West. Aina Hertelis Thomas, who was a PVS member for 46 years, died on March 20, 2019 at the age of 93. Aina was born in Latvia in 1925. A couple of PVS friends recall that she was married to a



young university student (Kurts) and they had two very young children. He studied at night in a college lab situated near the rail yards. At that time the properties were bouncing back and forth between the Germans and the Russians. One of those countries blew up the rail yards and Aina's husband was killed. Aina was then in a camp for displaced persons and found a job in an orphanage as a nursing assistant. She came to this country where she lived with a dentist and his family and eventually graduated from dental school.

Aina was an integral part of PVS. She told of skiing to school as a child, and that when she started skiing here she realized that it could be fun, not just a mode of transportation that she used to get to school in Latvia. She worked to plan and host events.

She was enthusiastic, had a wonderful sense of humor, and had a mischievous streak. On one occasion, she and friends took a movie of her dental expertise with a --- carved pumpkin sitting in her dental chair. PVS cheered when she and fellow PVSer, Hank Thomas were married. Aina was a generous and loving friend who considered everyone in her community as her family.

The Triaus, Margaret Wyckoff and I were welcomed at her memorial service on March 30th at the Latvian Evangelical Lutheran Church in Rockville. We listened to more of Aina's life stories. A lovely luncheon was served highlighting many Latvian specialties, including Aina's famous "Piragi"
