Directions to the home of Cara and Robert Jablon, 4573 Indian Rock Terrace, N.W., Washington, D.C.

<u>From Northwest D.C.:</u> Take Nebraska Avenue to the beginning of Foxhall Road. Go south on Foxhall Road one traffic light past the intersection of Foxhall and Reservoir to Q Street. Right on Q Street. Continue on Q Street for 1 block to the stop sign (45th St.) and make a right on 45th. Go two blocks and make a left (Q Lane). The street will dead-end into Indian Rock Terrace. Make a right and go up the hill. The Jablons' house is the fourth house up the hill on the right (a red brick and frame contemporary house).

From Potomac/Rockville/Gaithersburg: Take 270 South to 495 towards Virginia. Exit at Cabin John Parkway and continue south on the parkway until Arizona Avenue (1st traffic light after light at Chain Bridge). Make a left on Arizona and a right on MacArthur Boulevard (1st light). Continue on MacArthur Boulevard for about 1½ miles past the Safeway on the left. Shortly after passing the Safeway, MacArthur forks to the right and Reservoir Road goes to the left. Continue on MacArthur to Q Street (the next light after the light at the fork). Make a left on Q Street. Go 1 block to the stop sign (45th St.), and make a left on 45th. Go 2 blocks and make a left (Q Lane). The street will dead-end into Indian Rock Terrace. Make a right and go up the hill. The Jablons' house is the fourth house up the hill on the right (a red brick and frame contemporary house).

From Virginia (Chain Bridge): At the end of the Chain Bridge, make a right. Continue to the first light (Arizona Avenue). Make a left on Arizona and follow the directions immediately above from that point on.

<u>From Virginia (Key Bridge):</u> Stay in one of the left lanes at the end of the Key Bridge. Make a left at the end of the bridge to M Street (may be called Canal Road at that point). Get in the right lane and continue up the hill to the light at the beginning of Foxhall Road. Continue on Foxhall to the next light (Q Street). Make a left on Q Street. Go one block to the stop sign (45th St.) and make a right. Go 2 blocks and make a left (Q Lane). The street will dead-end into Indian Rock Terrace. Make a right and go up the hill. The Jablons' house is the fourth house up the hill on the right (a red brick and frame contemporary house.

Behind the Scenes at NASA/Goddard Space Flight Center Tuesday, June 11, 2019 from 12:45-3:30 pm

Did you know that many NASA satellites are being built and tested at Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, MD? PVS member **Dorian Janney** is the Outreach Coordinator for the Global Precipitation Measurement (GPM) mission. She will lead a "behind the scenes" tour for PVS focusing on the GPM mission.



We will have a presentation on this mission from a GPM scientist, hear from the GPM Applications Coordinator about how the data are being used to improve life in a variety of ways, visit the satellite Ground Control Room, and learn from the GPM Communications Engineer about how the data from GPM and the supporting satellites in the constellation are collected and stored at GSFC.



We will also visit the "shake and bake" (Spacecraft Systems Development and Integration) facility and see the vacuum chambers, high capacity centrifuge, and one of the largest cleanrooms in the world!

We will meet at the GSFC Visitor's Center in Greenbelt, MD at 12:45 PM on June 11th. There is plenty of parking there, as well as a nice free museum to explore and a gift shop to visit, if you so desire. Feel free to arrive early if you want time to visit the gift shop and museum. If we have 15 or more people, NASA/GSFC will provide a van to take us on our tour. If not, we will caravan in as few cars as possible to assist in being able to park close to the buildings we will visit. There will be some walking, but there are elevators in all buildings that we will visit.

This is a rare opportunity to be able to come on the GSFC campus and visit these facilities, and even rarer to have scientists and engineers give us their time and energy! So, come on out and find out how and why NASA is measuring global precipitation and be awed by the incredible science and technology being developed right here in the greater Washington metropolitan area.

As we will be going on the secure campus, there was a cut-off date of April 16th

to sign up for this tour. **However, there is a 'waiting list' for reservations.** We will need to send in your credentials (name, driver's license number, etc.) six weeks before the tour to get your oncampus badging. This tour will be open only to U.S. citizens due to security restrictions.

BRSC Snowmass, Colorado Ski Trip 2020

Trip Details

Once again we will be staying at the Snowmass Mountain Chalet (SMC) which offers a convenient ski in, ski out location. Check the web-site at www.mountainchalet.com. The "Land Only" package includes: transportation to and from Aspen airport (7am -11pm); 5 day Senior lift pass (good for all four ski areas in the Aspen complex, free shuttle bus) with option for extra days; 7 nights lodging (double occupancy); daily breakfast & soup lunch; luggage handling; a welcome reception; BRSC sponsored après ski events & a dinner, plus the NASTAR ski race. Additional nights at Snowmass are an option based on availability. Trip insurance is available through Encompasse Tours and is highly recommended. For trail information check www.aspensnowmass.com.

The basic package at \$1,820 includes a 5 day Senior lift pass for skiers 65 and over. Skiers under 65 will have to add \$81.00.

PARK CITY – DEER VALLEY, March 7-14, 2020

Park City and Deer Valley are premier ski destinations. We invite PVS skiers and their friends to a special PVS Park City – Deer Valley trip.



PARK CITY has varied terrain for all skiers. It has 348 trails, close to half of which are suited for intermediate skiers, 13 bowls and a 3,200 foot vertical drop with advanced and expert terrain. It now incorporates the Canyons ski area. *Park City has skiing opportunities for everybody*.

Known for its upscale amenities, including fine mountain dining and shopping, DEER VALLEY claims to be the nation's premier ski resort. It has an uphill lift capacity of 50,470 skiers per hour. Notably, *Deer Valley does not allow snowboards* and limits ticket sales to prevent overcrowding.

PARK CITY's Main Street is on the National Register of Historic Places, and is home to dozens of fine restaurants, bars, unique shopping experiences and art galleries.

TRIP INCLUSIONS:

- Seven nights' lodging at the Peaks Hotel Park City (two to a room), including lodging taxes and baggage handling. The Peaks is a full service hotel with pools, a sauna, fitness center and ski storage.
- Daily breakfasts.
- Welcoming dinner Saturday, March 7th.
- Departing dinner Friday, March 13th.
- At least 3 Après Ski events.

SLOPES TRANSPORTATION: The bus stops 21 steps from the hotel entrance. Busses are every 20 minutes. Also, the Peaks has a private Park City shuttle every hour on the hour, and Deer Valley shuttle every hour on the half hour.

AIR: Because of people's different travel and payment preferences, we do not include air transportation and airport shuttles. Doug Horstman of Encompasse Tours recommends Canyon Transportation between the airport and hotel, which can be booked online.

LIFT TICKETS: Trip participants may want to ski four days at Park City and two at Deer Valley, although they can vary lift ticket purchases to match their preferences. Lift ticket prices vary greatly with skier ages, the number of days for ticket purchases, ski areas, ski pass arrangements and the like. There are price discounts for 20 tickets, which need not necessarily be for the same day or person. Doug will package trip participants' lift tickets for convenience and will get the best available prices. We shall charge separately for ski lift tickets when they are purchased closer to the trip.

SIGN-UPS: *Trip participants can sign up now*. The trip should be during a good ski weather week. We shall try to maximize trip cohesion and provide for coordinated group-member skiing, good restaurants and other desired, joint activities. Prices for included items - \$1,260 per person; initial deposit - \$50 per person. 10. There will be no monthly meetings in July or August. Nancy inquired about a host for the September meeting, and


John Holt volunteered.
