President's Message

From Washington, DC: Take River Road (MD-190) to Falls Road in Potomac. Turn left onto Falls Road (MD-189), proceed 3/4 of mile, and turn left onto Garden Way. Take the 2nd left onto Garden Court; house is the 4th on the left.

From Gaithersburg: Take I-270 toward Washington and merge onto Falls Road (MD-189 S) via exit 5. Stay on Falls Road for about 5.6 miles. (You will go past River Road at Potomac Village.) Turn left onto Garden Way. Take the 2nd left onto Garden Court; house is the 4th on the left.

From Virginia: After crossing the American Legion Bridge into MD on the beltway, take exit 41 towards Carderock. Stay to the left and merge onto the Clara Barton Parkway. After 1.7 miles, turn left on MacArthur Blvd. After 2.2 miles, turn right on Falls Road (MD-189). Proceed 1.3 miles and turn right onto Garden Way. Take the 2nd left onto Garden Court; house is 4th on the left.

(local) son helps me rake and drag the leaves in old tarps to the street. Alas, now he does not think it the great fun activity as he did when he was a child and occasionally got to ride on the leaves in the tarp as it was dragged away to the street. Needless to say, I am very grateful that he helps me in the leaf assembling and dragging chore.

Of course, it is a time when I prepare for the winter ski season, making sure our ski equipment is tuned up and functioning correctly; changing from summer tires to snow tires; and planning our ski trips to Snowmass, Salt Lake, Vermont, and possibly others depending upon the snow conditions. This year I hope to ski locally as it has been many years since I have been to Ski Liberty or Round Top. I am curious to ski Whitetail since I have never skied there. Furthermore, I wonder how these areas have changed or improved and what changes the Vail purchases of these ski resorts will bring to the skiing experience this year.

One change that has already been announced, as you may know, is the change in the available ticket products at these ski resorts. Skiing appears to be a more expensive proposition than in previous years at these resorts. This may affect the older skier who was able to ski four hours a day midweek at a very reasonable cost. Now, the single day ticket products are for the entire day and evening and the senior ticket cost is about twice the cost of the previous four-hour ticket. Also, it is not clear whether groups will receive any additional discount. It may depend on the size of the group. Nevertheless, it seems that individual tickets will be less expensive if you buy them online instead of at the window. So, if you plan to ski these areas, buy them online as early as you can and at least the night before. The ticket appears to be cheaper than at the ticket window.

Since there have been heavy snowfalls out west already; hopefully, this year's winter will provide sufficient snow to all the ski areas: locally, out west and in New England. I intend to ski in all three regions this year and look forward to another great season. I hope your ski season will be great, too!!

IN MEMORIAM

George Birnbaum, age 88, died on September 20, 2019. He transferred to PVS from Capital Golden Skiers on September 20, 2013 and was a member of PVS until 2017. He was married to the late Celia Chen, who was also a PVS member. A PVS friend, Paul Levy, described George as a graceful skier, but one who stayed away from moguls. George sometimes skied with PVS at Snowmass/Aspen, while staying with family at Aspen. Following is his obituary, which appeared in the Ithaca Journal on Oct. 17.



George (Ignatz) Birnbaum - 1931-2019



George (Ignatz) Birnbaum, 88, passed away September 12, 2019 in Vienna, Austria, while travelling with family.

Born in Krakow, Poland on July 14, 1931 to Heinrich and Helena (Schönberg) Birnbaum, George was an only child. A Polish Jew, he survived the Nazis in WWII, settling with his family in Vienna. As a young man, George emigrated to New York City in 1952 to study chemistry at Columbia University. After earning his PhD in Organic Chemistry, he moved to Ottawa where he enjoyed a long career at the National Research Council of Canada as a crystallographer, using X-rays to determine three-dimensional structures of crystallized chemical compounds. He published numerous, scientific papers, and was proud and honored to have

experiments included on Space Shuttle missions as well as solving the crystal structure for the anti-viral AIDS drug AZT.

George married Karin (Bjåmer) Birnbaum in 1967, and together they settled in Ottawa, Ontario where they welcomed their daughter, Ellen, and son Eric. After divorcing in 1991, George later married long-time friend and colleague, Celia Chen. Together they relocated from Ottawa to Gaithersburg, Maryland.

George was a lover of classical music, avid skier, proud scientist and crystallographer, and lecturer. Noted curmudgeon, George wasn't happy unless he had something to complain about.

George was predeceased by his parents and his second wife, Celia. George is survived by his children, Ellen Birnbaum and Eric (Corrina) Birnbaum, his grandchildren, Rowan and Adina, and his stepchildren, Tien-Yee Chiu (Michael Magan) and Tien-Seng (Tara) Chiu. He will be deeply missed by his cousin Mary Salton and her extended family. Memorial to be held in Ithaca NY on Oct 27th at the Country Club of Ithaca, 189 Pleasant Grove Rd, Ithaca, NY at 11:00am, followed by a reception. Donations in lieu of flowers can be made to a Jewish charity of your choice.

A Day on the River with PVS Thursday, October 3, 2019

Maybe you remember the days when the Anacostia was a river to avoid at all costs. Well, those days are gone! There's a renaissance happening on this urban river and 20 PVSers and friends went to see it first-hand on a perfectly cool day in October.

Arranged by Marianne Soponis, the President and CEO of the Anacostia Watershed Society Jim Foster took us on a tour of this wild and scenic river by bimini-covered pontoon boat all the while providing wealth a information and entertaining repartee along the two-hour roundtrip from Bladensburg Waterfront Park. river has the feel of far-flung places -Costa Rica comes to mind – yet is easily accessible to us here in the DC area.



On our tour we noted Dueling Creek where people in past centuries

came to settle their differences in a way that was, unsurprisingly, prohibited in DC proper! A beautiful bike path along the river is reputed to be the longest municipal bike trail in the country and scenic walkways are planned to cross the river further downstream next to DC. We saw numerous birds (kingfishers, cormorants, red-tail hawks, egrets and an eagle) and at least one human kayaker making his way along the

peaceful waterway.



The goal of the Anacostia Watershed Society is for the river to be "fishable and swimmable by 2025" and they're making significant progress on that goal. Efforts to trap trash before it reaches the river have been set up and a multi-year and multi-jurisdictional process to divert sewage away from the river has successfully left the Anacostia sewage free. There remains a higher-than-desired concentration of algaeencouraging nitrogen which is being tackled in several ways including introducing river mussels (75,000 so far this year!) to help clean that and other pollutants naturally. Wetland restoration is underway to rehabilitate these "kidneys" of the river which serve as an additional kind of water purifier. Geese are routinely rounded up and removed to keep them from devouring the new marshland growth.

Yet PCBs and microplastics are still present and drugs that have been improperly disposed of create other more difficult problems for the growth of fish along this and other rivers in the country. Especially interested in progress along

the river was PVSer Shirley Rettig, as she had been involved in water analysis at the United States Geological Survey in her working life.

The efforts of the Anacostia Watershed Society, and local and national entities are astonishing and are transforming this lovely river into the treasure that it should be for all of us. Yet there are more things we can all do. Mr. Foster suggests several ways we can help:

- Consider ways to reduce the amount of trash you generate. Paper takes a year to break down and plastic about 100 years!
- Pick up roadside trash when you can and encourage others as well especially Styrofoam
- Don't use or buy plastic straws
- Dispose of unused drugs responsibly and not into the water system
- Don't plant English Ivy which is a notoriously invasive plant
- Tell others about the lovely Anacostia River and consider a trip down the river yourself

Many thanks to Marianne for arranging this fascinating tour (much too much information to include it all here) and for Jim Foster of the Anacostia Watershed Society for opening our eyes to the beauty of this river and the work being done to preserve it for future generations.

SKI TALK November 2019



Tom Tycz, Inge Lesjak, and Kerry Hines represented PVS at the Blue Ridge Ski Council (BRSC) meeting on October 5, held at Liberty Ski Resort. The news this year about local ski resorts is that Vail Resorts has purchased Peak Resorts, which includes Liberty, Whitetail, and Roundtop. The immediate effect is that local skiing will cost more. These resorts will no longer offer the four-hour ski ticket, and the daily rate for seniors will be \$59.00. The Peak Pass will still be good at these properties for the 2019-20 season. Now that they are Vail properties, the Epic Pass can also be used.

The following 2021 BRSC trips were selected:

The Western Carnival will be held at Telluride, Colorado from January 23 to January 30, 2021. Effic Rubinstein from Sportours was selected as the tour operator.

Eurofest in 2021 will be held in **Davos, Switzerland from February 26 to March 6**, **2021**. Holidaze was selected as the tour operator

The Winterfest will be held at Jay Peak, Vermont from March 7 to March 12, 2021. The tour operator is Bianchi Outdoor Adventure.

PVS will decide at a later date if we will join the above trips. While our club does not always join the BRSC trips, as a member of PVS you can go on any of the council trips by accompanying one of the other council clubs. Check out the BRSC website at: skicouncil.com.

Other news from the meeting is that an Airport Overnight Lodging and Parking Program has been organized for 2020 at all three regional airports. For \$89 per room plus local taxes, you will also get 8-day free parking and free airport shuttle. The airport hotels are: Marriott at Dulles; Springhill Suites at BWI; and Courtyard Marriott at Reagan. If you are interested in using this program, let your trip leader know.

The BRSC Western Carnival at Snowmass this coming January has over 300 people from eight ski clubs participating. Our club will be staying at Mountain Chalet. Other clubs will be at different hotels in Snowmass. The BRSC events will be in the Viceroy Center in the Snowmass Base Village. As part of the BRSC activities, there will be a NASTAR race. We are encouraging all of our members who are going on the trip to participate. It is a fun event, and it is age-graded. A gold medal may be waiting for you.

Local Ski Shops: For years, PVS members have gone to Brian Eardley at Ski Center for boot fitting and any question related to skiing. When the Ski Center closed a couple years ago, Brian went to a ski shop near Baltimore. You will be glad to know that Brian is now at Alpine Ski Shop in Fairfax. It is best to call for an appointment if you want to see him. Ryan Susse is no longer at Sun and Ski. I was not able to find out where he currently is.

Once again, we will be staying at the Snowmass Mountain Chalet (SMC), which offers a convenient ski in, ski out location. Check the web-site, The "Land Only" package includes: transportation to and from Aspen airport (7am -11pm); 5 day Senior lift pass (good for all four ski areas in the Aspen complex, free shuttle bus) with option for extra days; 7 nights lodging (double occupancy); daily breakfast & soup lunch; luggage handling; a welcome reception; BRSC sponsored après ski events & a dinner, plus the NASTAR ski race. Additional nights at Snowmass are an option based on availability. Trip insurance is available through Encompasse Tours and is highly recommended. (Trail information.)

The basic package at \$1,820 includes a 5 day Senior lift pass for skiers 65 and over. Skiers under 65 will have to add \$81.00.

PARK CITY – DEER VALLEY, March 7-14, 2020

Park City and Deer Valley are premier ski destinations. We invite PVS skiers and their friends to a unique PVS Park City – Deer Valley trip.



PARK CITY has varied terrain for all skiers. It has 348 trails, close to half of which are suited for intermediate skiers, 13 bowls and a 3,200-foot vertical drop with advanced and expert terrain. It now incorporates the Canyons ski area. Park City has broad skiing opportunities for everybody. Known for its upscale amenities, including fine mountain dining and shopping,

DEER VALLEY claims to be the nation's premier ski resort. It has an uphill lift capacity of 50,470 skiers per hour. Notably, *Deer Valley does not allow snowboards* and limits ticket sales to prevent overcrowding.

PARK CITY's Main Street is on the National Register of Historic Places and is home to dozens of fine restaurants, bars, unique shopping experiences and art galleries.

TRIP INCLUSIONS:

- Seven nights at the Peaks Hotel Park City (two to a room), including lodging taxes and baggage handling. The Peaks is a full-service hotel with pools, a sauna, fitness center and ski storage.
- Daily breakfasts.
- Welcoming dinner Saturday, March 7th.
- Departing dinner Friday, March 13th.
- At least 3 Après Ski events.

SLOPES TRANSPORTATION: A City ski bus stops 21 steps from the hotel entrance. Busses come every 20 minutes. Also, the Peaks has a private Park City shuttle every hour on the hour and a Deer Valley shuttle every hour on the half hour.

AIR: Because of different travel and payment preferences, we do not include air transportation and airport shuttles. Doug Horstman of Encompasse Tours recommends Canyon Transportation, which can be booked online, for transportation between the airport and hotel.

LIFT TICKETS: Trip participants may want to ski four days at Park City and two at Deer Valley, but they can vary lift ticket purchases to meet preferences. Lift ticket prices vary with skier ages, the number of ski days purchased areas, ski pass arrangements and the like. There are ski area discounts for 20 tickets, which need not necessarily be for the same day or person. Doug Horstman will package participants' lift tickets for convenience and to obtain the best available prices. We shall charge separately for ski lift tickets when they are purchased closer to the trip.

SIGN-UPS: The trip should be during a good ski weather week. We shall try to maximize trip cohesion and provide for coordinated group-member skiing, good restaurants and other desired, joint activities. Prices for included items - \$1,260 per person (single hotel room use supplement additional \$930), \$550 due now.

ADDITIONAL PARTICIPANTS OR POTENTIAL PARTICIPANTS SHOULD LET US KNOW AS SOON AS POSSIBLE SO THAT WE CAN ATTEMPT TO ENSURE HOTEL SPACE AND PRICING. We currently have an extra room reserved effectively through November 26, 2019.

PVS Biennial Dues Cycle – July 1, 2019-June 30, 2021 The 120-day grace period for remitting dues for the new 2019-2021 biennial membership cycle has ended as of today. Therefore, PVS Members who have not paid their dues have had their membership terminated.
