# Bing Ting Poon February 26, 1924 – December 14, 2009

My good friend, Bing Poon died while skiing with me at Killington, Vermont on December 14, 2009. I knew Bing for several years, as his snow sports school director at Whitetail, and PSIA-E Educational Staff member.

Bing was born in San Francisco in 1924 and moved to Keokuk, Iowa, as a child. During World War II, he volunteered for the Army Enlisted Reserve Corps and ended the war with the Fighting 69<sup>th</sup> Division, the first Army unit to meet up with the Russians on the Elbe River in Germany. During the war he received a Combat Infantry Badge, a Purple Heart, a Bronze Star

for Heroic Achievement and another Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster. He never missed a reunion or a trip with his army friends and was on the Board of Directors for the 69<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division Organization.

Bing completed his University Studies after WWII at the University of California and then earned a Masters and a Ph.D. at the University of Colorado in 1951. Bing had a 35 year career with the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research in Washington, DC. At Walter Reed he was part of a team that developed antiparasitic drugs for the military. Bing coauthored many papers on his work at Walter Reed.

We will miss Bing, his silly jokes, his constant smile through his wire rimmed glasses, his passion for skiing, and achieving Level III. I am hoping that when God calls me home that I go as Bing went with a smile on my face over a snow covered bump.

Bing Poon (85) joined the club in 1974; therefore, he had been a PVS member for 35 years. He served on ExCom, beginning in 1978. Jan Marx shared that he was a physicist, a ski instructor at the Homestead, and skied New England frequently.

#### **David Warthen**

He was in my tour group on two tours of Europe with the 69th Infantry Assn. in 2005 and 2008. He was a funny, energetic, smart, sweet man.

He was also a long-time member of the Richmond Ski Club. It just seems so appropriate to me that Bing died at Killington. He was one of the most committed skiers I knew in a club of pretty committed skiers.

#### **Mary Ward**

I recall a meeting in the early 60's upstairs in the old Lavender Hill Mob Pit Stop that I believe it was Dick King who introduced Bing as prospective member with a memorable name. My memory is not perfect but I thought Dick said his name is Bing Ting Poon. He might have been joking but nevertheless it's a memorable name and I remember he had a great personality.

#### **Keith Lvon**

Bing worked on the weekend ski patrol at the Homestead in Virginia for a number of years until he retired. After retirement, he moved to Mercersburg, Pa. He wanted to be near a ski area (Whitetail) and a state that did not tax government pensions. He worked at Whitetail for a number of years giving ski lessons, and I think he was also on the ski patrol. For the upcoming year they would not let him give lessons, but he was to be the Whitetail Ambassador giving mountain trail tours to new skiers. After Whitetail closed in March, he would go on a number of western ski trips.

#### **Charles Huggins**

I knew Bing from trips, but do not recall a conversation with him, just heard his clever remarks. I was deeply moved by the thoughtfulness he expressed in a condolence card for David. Here is what he wrote with ink on the other side of this card.

"He will be remembered as a great individual and a wonderful skier. His spirit will be with all of us, PVS Skiers, with every turn we make."

## February 18 to 25, 2010

As of this point in time we have 39 people going on the trip and are awaiting word from a possible  $40^{th}$  person.

Slope side accommodations are at the Alpenhof Lodge, a cozy Bavarian style inn with ski in ski out access. There are five of six days lift tickets included (seniors over 65 can deduct \$100). Go on an optional trip over the Teton Pass to Grand Targhee where "the snow comes from heaven not hoses". Cross country skiers have trails outside the front door or options to ski in Grand Teton National Park and Grand Targhee. The trip begins at Dulles, then goes to Jackson, Wy, then a short bus ride to the "Hole". We have a welcome reception of gluwein and fondue.

Full buffet breakfasts are included every day at the hotel. Two group dinners are included, pre and post trip parties, and two après ski gatherings. A short bus trip into the town of Jackson reveals many opportunities for shopping, dining, touring, skiing, and reliving history in a true western town. Yellowstone N.P. is 60 miles north accessible by snowmobile or snowcoach, and a visit to the nearby National Elk Refuge will give you the opportunity to see a herd of 12,000-15,000 elk in winter.

# Be The Leader

Being the leader of a PVS club ski trip is both demanding and rewarding. As leader you are the host of the party, providing a great vacation for you fellow club members. You get to choose the resort, the lodging, and the dates. You also get part or all of your trip paid for as a "Comp" from the resort, the airline, and the tour operator.

Experience as a trip participant is more important than experience as a trip leader or as an assistant leader. You probably know where you like to ski best, what kind of lodging you like, and the importance (or unimportance) of price. Not everyone makes the same choices, but that leads to a nice diversity in our trip offerings.

Most of the work in running a ski trip is done before the trip leaves. Trip leaders normally consult with tour operators in making selections of destination, lodging and flights. It is difficult or impossible to get better prices by dealing directly with the ski resort and airlines. The trip committee will help you find a trusted tour operator who will do much of the work in planning the trip. The trip leader needs to promote the trip answer questions and collect payments from members. PVS trip guidelines require a co-leader who will help with the work. During the trip the leader will attend to details of group dinners or apres-ski parties and make sure that everyone is informed of transportation arrangements. The PVS Trip Guidelines are posted on our web site in the Club Docs. Section. These guidelines serve as a manual for running a trip.

Talk to the leader of a trip that you are on or to a member of the Ski Trip Committee to get various personal accounts of what it is like to run a ski trip. You may find that it is an activity that you will enjoy doing.
