FROM VIRGINIA ON THE BELTWAY CROSSING INTO MARYLAND: Take River Road (MD-190 E) exit (Exit 39B) toward Washington. Turn left onto Burdette Road and proceed 1.3 miles. Turn right on Bradley Boulevard (MD-191) and proceed 1.1 miles. Turn left onto Valley Road; take the first right onto Ridge Road. Continue on Ridge to the top of the hill, 8613 Long Acre Court is on the right (the first house in the cul-de-sac).

FROM WASHINGTON, DC, ON WISCONSIN AVENUE: Follow Wisconsin Avenue, crossing into Maryland. Turn left on Bradley Lane (MD-191 N) and proceed 2.7 miles. Turn right onto Valley Road. Take the first right onto Ridge Road. Continue on Ridge to the top of the hill, 8613 Long Acre Court is on the right (the first house in the cul-de-sac).

PVS/BRSC SKIING AND SIGHTSEEING ADVENTURE MT. BACHELOR AND BEND, OREGON JANUARY 31-FEBRUARY 7, 2015

Mt. Bachelor is the largest ski area in central Oregon, with terrain for all levels. The mountain is an extinct volcano, and you can ski with full lift service 360 degrees off the top for 3,365 vertical feet to the base, often through light, dry powder! It has the highest skiable elevation of any resort in Oregon or Washington and is far enough inland for drier snow conditions. The resort gets an average of 462 inches of snow a year on 88 runs, served by 10 lifts. (Mt. Bachelor is adding over 400 acres of ski terrain that is scheduled for opening in 2015). In addition, the resort has more than a dozen cross-country trails, 35 miles of which are groomed. The mountain grooms 40 of the 88 runs. Volunteer Mountain Hosts will ski with you all or part of the day, at your request.



The mountain is a 30-minute bus ride from Bend where you will be staying in the newly upgraded Double Tree Hotel. There is an indoor pool and hot tub. Southern Hemisphere Skiing During Our Summer:

It is hard for us to picture skiing during DC summers, but it is available in other parts of the world. In a previous TOOT, I remember presenting skiing in Chile, Australia, and New Zealand. However, there are many nice ski resorts in Argentina to consider. Never having traveled to South America, I am relying upon an excellent article by Eileen Smith, written in May 2013.

"Cerro Chapelco, located in Patagonia, is close to the resort town of San Martín de Los Andes, itself a couple of hours' drive from Bariloche, of chocolate and German architecture fame. The mountain (cerro) overlooks the stunning turquoise Lake Lácar, giving it one of the best views of all ski fields in South America. The resort is at low altitude, which means it is below the tree line, and offers tree-skiing, through forests of legnas, a type of beech tree native to the area.



The resort has 350 skiable acres, and has trails for downhill, cross country and a terrain park with a half pipe, and also parallel slalom trails. The longest run is about 3.3 miles long, and it has descents ranging from 20 to 45 degrees of slope. There are 22 trails of different skill levels, and lots of room for freestyle, freeride, and newly, catskiing, which they refer to as "back bowls," which are group outings to difficult-to-reach off-piste areas."

In Memory of Ronald R. Fett, PVS Charter Member

November 19, 1923 – March 16, 2014

We regret to inform you that Ronald R. Fett (90), PVS Charter Member, died on 16 March 2014. He lived in the same apartment for over 50 years in Arlington, Virginia, next to the the Iwo Jima Memorial. His PVS membership spanned 49 years. The first mention of Ron in a TOOT newsletter was in the November 1966 issue, where he described his Ski Instruction Program. Ron was a beautiful skier, according to Susan Brown (PVS Charter Member), and was an instructor at Cabin Mountain in West Virginia, and at Vail during his vacations. Aina Hertelis Thomas remembers that conversations with Ron were always about skiing, and that he was a real 'gentleman.'



Ron grew up in Judson, North Dakota. He served in the Army during WWII, attended the Univ. of Utrecht for at least some time on the GI bill and had a long career with USIA. Nancy Monacelli, PVS Charter Member, recalls that Ron was a purple heart recipient, and his skiing was really special to watch; he made it look so



smooth and effortless. He was a total gentleman, always willing to help out in any way he could, witty, interesting, and just a really nice person. Trudy Santoro (PVS Charter Member) recalled also

that Ron's skiing was really special to watch.

Ron was very social and participated in many ski trips: Jackson Hole, Vail, Snowmass, Vermont, West Virginia, and Homestead. One time he finished a ski race backwards to the applause of many. He also enjoyed Rehobeth Beach, DE, at 123 Norfolk Avenue and spent many summers with several other PVSers. He also appreciated history and toured the Antietam Battlefield with many PVSers.



Ron, 1965, Aspen

Ron volunteered at the Smithsonian for many years and commuted by bike. He was recognized as a volunteer in the following publications: By Aeroplane to Pygmyland: Revisiting the 1926 Dutch and ..., Vatican City Postage Stamps, and Die Vatikanstadt-Sammlung. Ron was also a photo editor and provided photos for the American magazine (a foreign publication) during his many careers. During some of the moon shots he flew to Cape Canaveral to pick up photos for the publication. He dubbed his co-beachgoers '39 and holding' while they watched the countdown for the first moon landing. The name stuck. Ron also worked for 20 years, almost exclusively, on various aspects of the Underwood & Underwood Glass Stereograph Collection of 28,000 photographs, which were cataloged individually.



Although Ron never held an office in PVS, he was keenly interested in the club. His article, "Skiers have to Ski to be Members of Potomac Valley," in the Washington Post in 1968

http://pvskiers.org/pdfs/Fett11-15-68.pdf> was certainly a boost to the membership shortly after the PVS formed in 1965.
