SKI TALK APRIL 2022



The cherry blossoms are blooming. The snow is melting. The days are getting longer. The ski season is ending. It must be spring. It is now time to begin planning for next ski season. The number or skiers in PVS has dwindled over the years. Instead of planning 3+ ski trips, we plan one or two. Since the Snowmass trip at Mountain Chalet is so popular, we try to keep that going from year to year. The Ski Trip Committee has also dwindled. There are only three of us presently: Nancy McKinley, Inge Lesjak and me. If anyone would like to get involved in ski trip planning, let me know.

In addition to planning the trip to Snowmass, we are

looking at the ski trips the Blue Ridge Ski Council (BRSC) is planning. This is the council of ski clubs in the metropolitan DC area, Baltimore, and Richmond. See the BRSC website <u>www.ski-council.com</u>. Through the years, PVS has participated in many BRSC trips. It's an added experience going on ski trips with other clubs and taking part in the group activities.

The BRSC European trip for next ski season (2023) is to Club Med, Val d'Isere, France. Val d'Isere has long been my favorite European ski destination, but I have never been on a Club Med vacation of any kind. As I read about this ski trip, it sounds too good to be true. It includes all meals; all drinks; ski passes; ski guides/instructors; and a champagne party every afternoon. This is a premier resort, and it is being upgraded to Five Star status this year. It is true ski in/ski out. Having a guide for five days is a big plus, since the ski area is immense. It is the highest resort in Europe so you can depend on good snow, but it is low enough (five thousand feet) that you can sleep comfortably. There are 186 miles of terrain with 20 green slopes, 67 blue slopes, 41 red slopes (blue/black), and 26 black slopes. There are 79 ski-lifts and they, alone, are worth the price of admission.



ExCom has approved PVS-participation in this trip. Mary Ellena Ward has agreed to be Trip Director for PVS. The cost of the trip with seven nights at Club Med and including air is approximately \$3500. See the preliminary flier in this TOOT. There will also be a pre-trip to Paris and post-trip to Lyon. Cost is not available presently for either pre- or post-trips. We are not taking reservations, until all details are worked out, but if you are interested, let Mary Ellena know.

Still reading! As the sunny days beckon us to wander outdoors, we still find time to read so many fascinating books. Some of us are even "reading" while listening to an audio book during our daily walks. Then we get together for an hour to talk about what we've discovered on the pages or through our earbuds. Consider joining us! See the info at the bottom for how to join in on April 14, 2022 (the second Thursday of each month) at 4 pm!

Here are the books we shared in March:

- <u>Bonnie Sweeney</u> picked up the new novel by Frederik Bachman, "Anxious People." The "kind of quirky" story is about a bank robbery gone wrong, with the characters of the hostages marvelously developed, according to Bonnie, who thoroughly enjoyed the book.
- <u>Karen Zill</u> told us about Kent Haruf's "Our Souls at Night," a lovely, gentle tale about 2 older people who develop an unusual relationship. Switching to nonfiction, Karen brought Michael Pollan's "This is Your Mind on Drugs." Pollan focuses on 3 plants that produce mind-altering effects: poppies, coffee, and mescaline and his experiences with each.
- <u>Ellie Thayer</u> read "From the Cold War to the Hot Peace" by former Ambassador to Russia, Michael McFaul, whose harassment from Vladimir Putin while he was stationed in Russia provides important insights into Putin's character. Ellie also noted a humorous book, "Dear Committee Members," by Julie Schumacher. It's a compendium of a professor's sincere and not so sincere letters of student recommendation.
- <u>Marianne Soponis</u> turned to historical fiction with "I Must Betray You" by Ruth Sepetys who writes of the regime of the duplicitous former Romanian President Ceausescu and his demands to turn everyone into informants on their neighbors. The story focuses on one young woman and a five-year period she spent as an unwilling informer.
- <u>Mary Ellena Ward</u> described "The Bookwoman of Troublesome Creek" by Kim Michele Richardson, a fictionalized account of packhorse librarians in Kentucky in the 1930s. The protagonist is a member of a family who had a genetic disorder resulting in a blue tinge to their skin and who suffered discrimination as a result.
- <u>Jan Marx</u> has been reading the novel "Stargazer" by Anne Hillerman who carries on the tradition of her famous author father, Tony Hillerman, with stories of the Navajo and their traditions in the beautiful US Southwest.
- <u>Nancy McKinley</u> raved about Louise Erdrich's latest novel, "The Sentence" set in present-day Minneapolis. The protagonist is an Indigenous woman working in a bookstore and rebuilding her life after serving in prison. Nancy highly recommends it as "the best" of Erdrich's novels with gorgeous prose, love, mystery and magic.

<u>SPRING SKIING</u> - Park City 2022, Cara Jablon



Skiing in Snowmass was wonderful, but I craved just a bit more slope time. Bob indulged me and we headed off for a mini ski trip to Park City. We went back to the Peaks Hotel, where we stayed two years ago on the trip we led to Park City. The hotel has added a second shuttle, so there is a shuttle every half hour in the morning to both Park City and Deer Valley. The hardest part of the day is the walk from the shuttle to the lift and back at the end of the day. I missed the convenience of Snowmass. Breakfast is still included, although the lines were long when breakfast opened because it was no longer self-service for the hot dishes.

The first three days, the weather was perfect – blue skies, bright sunshine, not too cold or too hot. On the last day, the temperature soared to the high 50s and the snow became heavy in places, particularly at the Canyons part of Park City. At this point, bare spots were beginning to appear in the slopes as the snowfall has been lower than average this season. I spent part of two days at the Canyons – it's easy to take the Gondola over from the center of the Park City area. On balance, although the Canyons has some nice long (but often narrow) runs, I way prefer the Park City part of the mountain.

Based on the heavy crowds at Park City, it appears that everyone is skiing, and no one is working. Saturday was particularly crowded, but the lift lines were not insignificant on the week-days. The resort did a good job of moving the lines and making sure that all spaces on the chairs were filled. Far less impressive was the amount of grooming at the mountain. In all the years that I have been going to Park City, the intermediate slopes on the King Con lift have been groomed. Not so this year: many of these runs had large moguls, with the result that the skiers congregated on the limited number of groomed runs. The same was true for the Canvons portion of the mountain – there was no grooming on some of the major intermediate runs from the top of the Dream Catcher lift. I made the mistake of skiing McDonald Meadows – ostensibly a blue run, only to find monster moguls that were a challenge to negotiate.

Speaking of moguls, I did get my quota of bump runs and even found a few that were almost in the category of "play bumps." Most notable were the run under the King Con lift line, which was quite skiable, and a series of bumps on the side of the major run from the top of the King Con lift down to the Silverlode lift. I also just had to ski Glory Hole and Fool's Gold, both of which had some evil bumps near the bottom.



The third day, on the first lift, I went up in the chair with a woman named Cookie from Massachusetts (she spends half the year in Florida and is an avid golfer). After talking on the chair, we decided to do a run together and found that we were well matched. We skied together for the full day, as well as the next day. She was amazing, as she had not skied for seven years, but had great technique and even skied the bumps with me. Cookie may be interested in going on our Snowmass trip next January.



Bob did ski three of the four days and regained some of his confidence. For Bob, of course, the highlight of any ski trip is dinner. Although restaurant reservations were hard to come by even two weeks in advance, we managed to eat very well. On our first night, having arrived at 10:30, we had pizza at the hotel restaurant, Versante. Saturday night, we went back to Reef's Restaurant, high on the top of Deer Valley, where we had our final dinner on our trip two years ago. The restaurant is as good as it was then. Bob and I shared an Israeli salad, followed by lamb chops for Bob and a chicken cutlet for me. For dessert, we shared an unusual chocolate cake that had the consistency of a bread pudding. Sunday, it was back to the hotel restaurant, where we both had an excellent seafood stew and a blueberry cobbler. We had dinner with Dale Gody, my first cousin, and her husband Bill. They moved from Chicago to Salt Lake City about three years ago and live about a 20-minute bus ride from Solitude. Bill takes the bus to Solitude once or twice a week, and also enjoys hiking and biking. He reports that Solitude is not crowded at all during the week – quite a difference from Park City. It sounds like a good life to me.

Monday night, we went downtown to Grappa, a fancy Italian restaurant on the top of Main Street in downtown Park City. We shared an excellent fried calamari appetizer, and I had an amazing pasta dish with mushrooms and sausages. Bob had Grappa's version of fish stew, with a large piece of lobster. Although rather overpriced, this restaurant is worth a visit. The restaurant is so popular that the only reservation I was able to procure was at 5:15. For our last night, we went to the Blind Dog restaurant, which is not downtown, but on nearby Kearns Avenue. The hotel shuttle dropped us off and picked us up when we were finished. Again, we had an excellent meal – Bob had a sushi appetizer and I had soft shell crab rolls. For the main course, Bob had red snapper and I went prosaic with a hamburger and mashed potatoes. We realized that we had not had much green vegetable or salad over the course of the four days.



That was it – we headed home the next day through Atlanta to DCA. I'm afraid that is the end of my skiing this season. Perhaps Chile this summer – my youngest son says that his Spanish is good enough that he would be happy to come and translate for me. I'm thinking that a less exotic idea would be Solitude next season. Both Solitude and Snowmass are on the Ikon pass, as is Steamboat, another ski area that I particularly like. Deer Valley is on the Ikon pass, but Park City is part of the Epic pass group. Everything considered, for those of us going to Snowmass, and planning to do any additional skiing at one of the Ikon resorts, it makes sense just to buy an Ikon pass in the summer, when they are the least expensive.
